  - Enhance their substantive and analytical understanding of MAPR.
  - Apply their learning to real-world empirical cases.
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## Module Content

This module will provide an in-depth exploration of both core theoretical perspectives and current debates related to the onset and prevention of atrocities. Students will critically examine key academic and policy discussions surrounding MAPR, acquiring knowledge of the preventive "toolkit" employed in the field. The course will address both "upstream" and "downstream" aspects of atrocity prevention, exploring the dynamics that contribute to the onset of atrocities as well as the strategies and interventions applied in their aftermath.

Students will be encouraged to develop the analytical skills needed to assess and engage with the latest research and practices in MAPR.
