# M.Ed. Aims and Learning Outcomes

On completion of M.Ed. programme, you should be able to demonstrate:

- Systematic understanding and critical awareness of current problems and new developments in education, curriculum, school leadership, and related social, psychological, and education issues;
- Practical expertise in relevant curriculum, leadership, and management areas;
- Skills in the management of change and innovation in educational settings; the application of their knowledge, comprehension, critical awareness, and problem-solving abilities within a framework of research;
- Research areas related to their field of study;
- Effective communication of the results of their research, or advanced technical and professional learning, to both specialist and non-specialist audiences.

# M.Ed. Structure

- Structure - 90 ECTS (1 x ECT = 20 hours of student effort):
  - **Four** strand specific modules (1 x 10 ECTS, 3 x 15 ECTS);
  - One “common” *Academic Literacy and Research Methods* module - ALRM (5 ECTS);
  - Dissertation module (including **Dissertation Support Sessions**) (30 ECTS).
- Routes:
  - One-year full-time;
  - Two-year part-time;
  - Three-year part-time.

# M.Ed. Assignments

- The 3 strand specific modules that are each 15 ECTS:
  - Assignments will be 4,000 - 5,000 words, or equivalent.
- The 1 strand module that is 10 ECTS:
  - The assignment will be 2,500 - 3,500 words, or equivalent.
- The *Academic Literacy and Research Methods* (ALARM) module that is 5 ECTS:
  - The assignment will be 1,500 - 2,000 words, or equivalent.

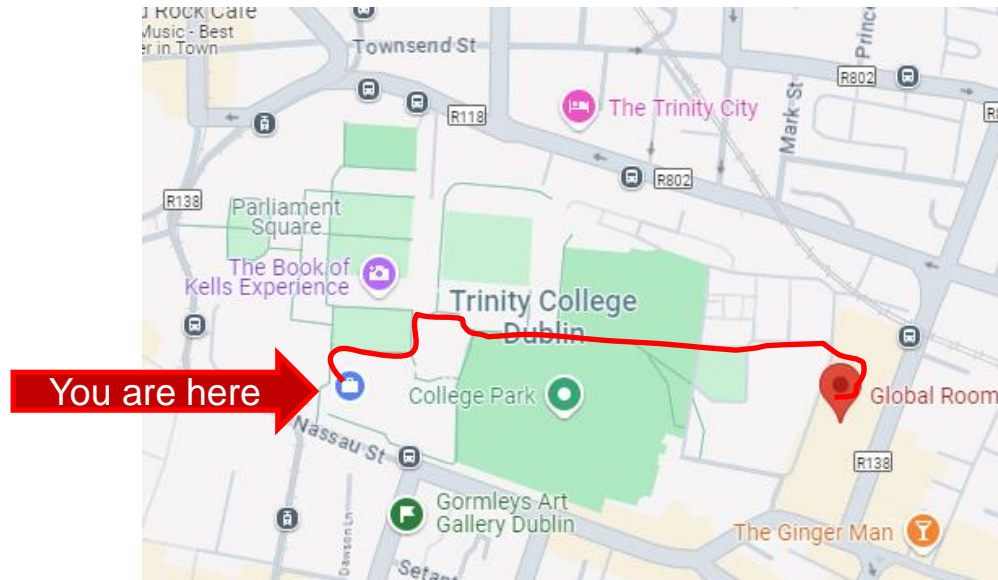

# Services – Students' Union

- Our motto at TCDSU is - 'we work for you!', and we do!
- We run an Accommodation Advisory Service, so you can check about your rights as a tenant, search for properties in Dublin, get general information about renting in Dublin and so much more!
- This is on our website @tcdsu.org We also run the Leap Card office in Teach 6, where we are located! This Leap Card service allows students to get their Leap Card for 10 euro - this allows you to travel all around Dublin.
- We also run an in house IT repair shop! This is run by Almir, who is the Union's technical officer. This will be the cheapest repair store in Dublin, and is for Trinity students only!

# Services – Students' Union

- The Union also has its very own student newspaper for you all of you aspiring journalists! This is called the University Times and is recognised worldwide as a leader in student journalism.
- There is also a Laptop Loan Scheme that the Union organises, so if you do not have a laptop - do not fear! The Union organises the scheme to help students who may have broken their laptop, or just don't have one.
- The Union also has two SU Shops on the campus, and we also organise the SU Cafe in Goldsmith Hall! This cafe has the cheapest coffee and sandwiches in Dublin, and the atmosphere is unmatched - it is completely student run!
- AMLCT/TCDSU also organises the annual Trinity Ball - Europe's largest private party in mid-April! 7000 tickets sell out in five minutes, so you gotta be quick!

# Class Representative – Run!

- As a class rep you will have the opportunity to speak on behalf of your classmates to your lecturers, your course administrators and your school. Once a month, you will have the opportunity to represent your classmates at TCDSU council and at your Faculty Assembly. Here, you will play a vital role in making decisions that will impact all students in the college.
- Every course, module, and student faces different academic issues - and class reps are often the best way that these issues can be resolved! In the past, class reps have also organised class hoodies and planned course events.
- Being a class rep is a fun opportunity to gain new skills, meet new people, and have a say in your academic experience at Trinity, as well as the campaigns that TCDSU runs!

# Timeline

- Nominations: Postgraduate (PGR + PGT): Open from 2nd September to 27th September.
- Undergraduate Students (UGs): Open from 16th September to 27th September.
- Elections scheduled for 2nd, 3rd, and 4th October. Results will be announced on 7th October.
- Training for newly elected representatives will take place on the 12th and 13th October, ahead of our first TCDSU/AMLCT Council on the 15th of October. Training will take place in Mount Wolseley in County Carlow, and it will be an overnight stay.
