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1. Introduction

The purpose of the annual report to the University Council is threefold:

- to provide the University Council, and the wider College community, with the statistical information needed to make informed policy decisions about graduate education in the College,
- (ii) to report on the work of the Graduate Studies Office, and
- (iii) to make the required statutory reports to University Council regarding examiners appointed for higher degrees.

This report is a combined report for years 2011/12 and 2012/13 as no report was produced in 2012/13. Statistical data covers the period 2012/13 and 2013/14, and postgraduate admissions data covers the period from September 2012 to the end of February 2013.

2. Graduate Studies Office

The Dean of Graduate Studies is head of the Graduate Studies Office (GSO). The Dean is supported by two Administrative Officers, one Senior Executive Officer and four Executive Officers.

The Dean of Graduate Studies has statutory responsibility for admitting all postgraduate students and administering the regulations regarding their academic progression and examination. The Graduate Studies Office (GSO) acts as the central coordinating office for postgraduate education in College.

Responsibilities of the Dean of Graduate Studies supported by the Graduate Studies Office include:

Development of Graduate Education Policy
This is achieved by

- (a) Convening the Graduate Studies Committee consisting of all the Directors of Teaching and Learning (Postgraduate) in the Schools, Keeper of Readers' Services, the ISS Representative, President and Vice President of the Graduate Students' Union, and bringing before it matters of importance relating to graduate education including changes to the regulations concerning higher degrees (see *University Calendar Part 2* page 9 for the Terms of Reference of the Graduate Studies Committee);
- (b) Attending national and international fora (e.g. Irish Universities Association, European Universities Association, Coimbra Group Taskforce, Dublin Region Higher Education Alliance meetings) and using this information to develop discussion papers on matters of importance for developments in graduate education;
- (c) Representing the graduate education function on College committees and compiling and interpreting information regarding graduate education for such committees;

(d) Updating and revising procedures of admission, progression and examination, and making the required changes to the *University Calendar Part 2:*

Administration of postgraduate courses

There were 184 separate courses of study at postgraduate level in the College in 2010/11. These are administered by the GSO and Schools. Administrative tasks include

- (a) Providing specialist advice and assistance to Schools in the development of new postgraduate courses. Specifically, the GSO staff ensure that proposed admissions criteria adhere to the College regulations, that the ECTS values apportioned to modules are correct, that proposed entries comply with the *University Calendar Part 2* regulations and the *Prospectus*, and that the documentation prepared for the Graduate Studies Committee and the University Council is complete;
- (b) Liaising with the College community to produce the annual *Postgraduate Prospectus*;
- (c) Dealing with initial enquiries about postgraduate programmes both in the areas of research and taught (Masters and Postgraduate Diploma) courses;
- (d) Monitoring the quality of taught postgraduate courses by reviewing and distributing course examiners' reports and ensuring that recommendations are acted on;
- (e) Assisting the Quality Office with reviewing taught postgraduate programmes as part of the School review process, and also initiating occasional course reviews outside the normal process when required;
- (f) Promoting the College's postgraduate programmes through advertisement and attendance at national and international career exhibitions and fairs.

Provision of services for graduate students

- (a) Setting and monitoring the quality of graduate admissions to the College. All students are admitted to the University by the Dean of Graduate Studies *via* direct admissions: the GSO receives and processes applications for admission liaising with Directors of Teaching and Learning (Postgraduate) in the Schools for research students and the Course Directors for admission to taught programmes.
- (b) Setting regulations for students' academic progress and monitoring these regulations, e.g. transfer from the Masters to Ph.D. register, confirmation on the Ph.D. register, time on the research register;
- (c) Attending to postgraduate student 'cases' in correspondence with the student, the Course Director, the supervisor, or the Director of Teaching and Learning (Postgraduate, DTLP);
- (d) Processing research thesis submissions and appointment of external examiners for taught courses and research degrees;
- (e) Receiving and reviewing examination results, distributing examiners reports, and convening of appeals by Academic Appeals Committee for Graduate Students (which is a sub-committee of the Graduate Studies Committee);

(f) Preparing documentation for the sub-committee of Board and Council for the approval of higher degrees.

3. Graduate Studies Committee

The Graduate Studies Committee (GSC) normally meets monthly during statutory term. The composition of the Graduate Studies Committee is listed in the *University Calendar Part 2*.

In 2011/12, and in 2012/13, there were eight meetings of the GSC. Minutes of the GSC are available *via* the Trinity College Local Home Page¹. The Committee discussed the following issues of interest to the general postgraduate community in College:

Graduate Studies Committee meeting minutes 2011/12 highlights:

GeneSIS (GS/11-12/003; 004; 023)

In September 2011 the Dean informed the Committee that the GeneSIS project was moving forward. The Committee agreed the introduction of course-related terminology to be used across College ('Course'; 'Programme'; 'Module'). The Dean advised that the new student system would handle all Direct applications and would replace PAC. At a recent demonstration for administrative and academic staff key features of the new student system were highlighted. It was noted that with the new system applicants would have to pay an application fee for each course they were applying for, while with PAC they could apply for up to five courses and pay just one fee. However, with the new system there was no limit on the no. of courses an applicant can apply for. It was noted that the feedback on the new student system had so far been very positive.

In March 2012 members of the GeneSIS team gave a brief presentation and update on activities. It was confirmed that CAO and postgraduate admissions were now live and that the single person record and web curriculum management had also been rolled out. Direct undergraduate admissions had not yet gone live and issues needed resolving and enhancements delivered in relation to postgraduate admissions. The team reported that user access, uploading of supplementary documents and email notifications were in testing and that analysis of the user interface was underway. It was reported that the issue of accessing applications in progress was under discussion with the Academic Secretary and the College solicitors as this was felt to have legal implications for the University. Several Schools expressed dissatisfaction with the SITS system and were concerned about the possible loss of applicants and acceptances. Some of their frustrations centred on the lack of email notifications being sent to applicants, applicants unable to upload documentation and accept their offers, problems in contacting relevant staff when issues arose, no logging system to track the progress of issues, the numerous documents and document formats being uploaded. In addition, it was expected that the number of applicants would decline in the new system as applicants had to apply for individual courses. The team agreed to consider the issues raised and bring forward solutions.

In December 2011, the Committee considered a document circulated by the GeneSIS team outlining the proposed admissions acceptance process. The proposal was for a one-step process in which the successful applicant would be required to pay a deposit at the time of accepting the course offer. Schools expressed some concerns in relation to the proposed new process. It was agreed that the process would be closely monitored and if there were major issues with recruitment then the process would be reconsidered.

Marie Curie Ph.D. Studentships (GS/11-12/005)

The Dean reported that the FP Marie Curie Initial Training Programme included some new schemes. The first is a European Industrial Doctorate, which would require collaboration between an academic institution and a private sector industrial partner in another country. As this does not exist in College at present a work group is being established to look into this. The second is an Innovative Doctoral Programme which requires a mandatory innovation training programme, which the Innovation Academy will be able to provide.

New Course Proposals (GS/11-12/006)

Under AOB, the Dean emphasized the need to submit new course proposals for review by the Committee as early as possible in the year. Many, she stated were not running or were unable to fill places. The Course Co-ordinator is requested to contact the Dean with any pre-draft proposals as early as possible with the aim of bringing the final proposal to the Graduate Studies Committee within Michaelmas term.

Draft Institutional Self-Assessment Report (ISAR) (GS/11-12/009)

The Dean reported that as part of the Institutional Review of Irish Universities, an Institutional Self-Assessment document had been drafted in accordance with the guidelines provided by the IUQB. The document was discussed at various College committees.

Trinity Inclusive Curriculum (GS/11-12/011)

The end of project evaluation report was presented to the Committee along with a number of recommendations. The aim of the TIC is to embed good inclusive practices within the mainstream environment. Several recommendations were proposed as part of this process.

Student Evaluation of Modules (GS/11-12/012)

Following consideration of the Annual Report on Student Evaluation of Modules the Quality Committee made several recommendations. It was noted that the online survey was effective but led to lower response rates. In order to maximize response rates it was suggested that an option would be provided at the beginning of the questionnaire to enable a student to tick whether they were satisfied, or not and that a textbox would be inserted following this to allow the student to comment more fully. It was suggested by the Quality Committee that postgraduate courses, rather than modules, should be evaluated. This was agreed in principle. In addition, there was a discussion on the timing of these surveys, and there was support for surveying at the end of the taught component and again following the dissertation.

Industrial/Enterprise Ph.D. (GS/11-12/013)

The Dean confirmed that a working group had been established to consider the title for a new Ph.D., its learning outcomes, supervision arrangements and examination, and was now seeking input from the Graduate Studies Committee.

Academic Streamlining of Regulations (GS/11-12/019)

The Chair of the GeneSIS project informed the Committee that Schools were being invited to consider how best to harmonise and simplify assessment regulations for undergraduate and postgraduate courses. He explained that a number of assessment models had been developed based on the most commonly used current practices across the College and it was confirmed that the GeneSIS team would work with Schools to map their courses onto an appropriate number of assessment regulation options.

International Recruitment (GS/11-12/020)

The VP for Global Relations informed the Committee about various scholarship opportunities available for postgraduate students wishing to study at TCD. She referred to the Indian Scholarship scheme comprising 16 scholarships valued at €3000 each across the faculties. She also mentioned the Government of Ireland Scholarship scheme which aims to raise Ireland's international visibility as a destination for postgraduate education. These scholarships targeted at one-year Taught Masters students provide for €10000 towards living expenses and a full fee waiver. She also mentioned the Chinese Government Scholarship scheme.

Brown University (GS/11-12/021)

The Dean introduced a draft MOU between TCD and Brown University and explained that the proposal was for Brown University students to spend the third year of their undergraduate studies as a visiting student at TCD taking undergraduate modules and up to 15 ECTS of approved postgraduate modules. The student would return to Brown to complete their undergraduate education, and on completion, would return to TCD to complete a one-year Taught Masters degree. Schools that wished to participate provided a list of postgraduate modules that would be open to Brown University students during their time in TCD as a visiting student.

Ph.D. Policy within the European Context (GS/11-12/029)

The Dean commented that the article in the circulated paper on "The Principles of Innovative Doctoral Training" did not seek to change the nature of the Ph.D. qualification, but rather it acknowledges the way in which doctoral education is moving and stated that TCD already had many examples of this. The Dean reported that the HEA would conduct a review of doctoral education and would review completion rates and time to completion. He also stated that the IUA was coordinating interactions with the Brazilian government which could lead to scholarship opportunities for Brazilian students to study at Ph.D. level in Ireland.

Harmonisation of Assessment Regulations (GS/11-12/039; 048)

The Committee had been circulated with assessment and progression regulations for consideration. A full and comprehensive discussion took place over the course of the above Committee meetings and following feedback from the GSC, the Advisory Group on the Harmonisation of Assessment and Progression Regulations amended

the proposed document. Subject to additional amendments the Committee confirmed their broad support for the document and approved it for submission to the University Council.

Centralised Survey of Postgraduate Courses (GS/11-12/043)

The Quality Committee had established a working group chaired by the Dean of Graduate Studies to develop a postgraduate course survey and associated workflow. The Dean asked for comments in relation to the circulated document which outlined draft survey questions and the process associated with the centralized online evaluation of PG courses. Minor amendments suggested were subsequently approved.

TCD-UCD Certificate in Innovation & Entrepreneurship (GS/11-12/051)

The joint TCD-UCD Certificate in Innovation & Entrepreneurship was approved by the Committee. It was noted that there would be no cost to the School or student for a Ph.D. student taking this certificate due to the Innovation Academy having PRTLI funding until 2015.

Global Relations Strategy (GS/11-12/056)

The Global Relations Strategy document which focused on 3 strands (Internationalisation, Alumni Relations and Advancement) had been approved by the Board. The VP for Global Relations informed the Committee that TCD would focus on the recruitment of students from North America, India, China, Malaysia, Singapore, Saudi Arabia, Brazil, Russia and Central Asia. She explained that scholarships would be a priority in some areas such as India and China. She outlined the new structure of the area to include a new Director, regional officers with responsibility for specific areas and global officers located in the Schools. The new team would focus on marketing, branding, social networking, improving the website and brochures. She stated that €3m had been invested in the area and that by year 4, the GRS would provide a return of €9m in non-exchequer funding with 40% of this being returned to the Schools. She added that a fixed amount would be invested in student services to support increasing international student numbers.

4. New Course Proposals 2011/12 and 2012/13

New Courses 2011/12

MSC in Respiratory Physiotherapy (GS/11-12/006)

One-year, full-time, MSc in Respiratory Physiotherapy.

Doctorate in Education (GS/11-12/006)

The 5-year, part-time Doctorate in Education (D.Ed.) has changed to 6 years in duration.

Masters in Education Studies (Intercultural Education) (GS/11-12/010)

The proposed course will be delivered by the Marino Institute of Education but overseen by the Associated Colleges Degrees Committee (ACDC). A two-year part-time course with modules taken in year 1 and research project completed in year 2. The Committee approved the course for submission to the University Council.

M.Sc. in Translational Oncology (GS/11-12/018)

The Committee approved the course for submission to University Council.

M.Sc. in Immunology (GS/11-12/027)

Proposal circulated re the establishment of a M.Sc. in Immunology, which would provide a part-time option as well as a full-time option for students.

M.Phil. in Music Composition (GS/11-12/034)

The Committee approved the course for submission to the University Council.

Certificate in Nursing (Nurse/Midwife Prescribing) (GS/11-12/038)

The Committee approved the course for submission to the University Council.

BAI/MAI Integrated Engineering-Biomedical Engineering (GS/11-12/041)

It was proposed that a new strand in Engineering – Biomedical Engineering be established at PG level in line with developments at UG level.

Postgraduate Diploma in Sustainable Energy (GS/11-12/042)

The Committee approved this course for submission to Council.

Master in Fine Arts (GS/11-12/055)

The Committee approved the addition of 2 new strands, MFA (Theatre Directing) and MFA (Stage Design), for submission to the University Council.

Graduate Studies Committee meeting minutes 2012/13 highlights:

Royal Irish Academy of Music (RIAM) (GS/12-13/04; 19; 30)

The Royal Irish Academy of Music approved by the University Board and University Council as an Associated College. RIAM currently offers an MA and a Doctorate in Music Performance which are accredited by Dublin City University. College quality processes will be followed as part of the TCD accreditation for those RIAM courses, as well as for any new postgraduate courses introduced by RIAM. At a separate Committee meeting the Committee approved the course, Master of Music in Performance, (already being run by RIAM and validated by DCU), for submission to the University Council. The Committee also approved for submission to the University Council a new course titled, Doctorate of Music in Performance.

Online Education (GS/12-13/04; 26; 32)

The Provost requested that the Dean chair a taskforce to consider the academic issues and business case associated with Online Education and prepare a discussion paper for University Council by March 2013. The taskforce would include academic and external members and the paper to be discussed by GSC. This taskforce was subsequently set up and meetings were held with individual Schools. Arising out of these meetings it was noted that there was interest in developing technology-enhanced education across College. It was noted that where Continuing Professional Development was becoming a necessity (Pharmacy), online provision could best meet this need. The Committee acknowledged the need to progress swiftly with this. The Taskforce submitted a document for consideration by the University Council in March outlining its recommendations with regard to progressing this.

National Doctoral Framework (GS/12-13/04)

The HEA and IUA in consultation on the development of a national doctoral framework. To be brought to the Committee for discussion/input at a later date.

Research Supervision Guidelines (GS/12-13/05)

The Dean asked the Committee to review the document on Research Supervision Guidelines and provide any further input prior to its publication. The aim of the document is to provide supervisors with practical information on student supervision and provide further support through workshops.

It was suggested that more effort should be made by supervisors in order to maintain good relations with their students, and that mediation should be mandatory if/when relations breakdown. It was advised that all relationship breakdowns be documented with clear paper trails in the event of appeals. It was mentioned that in the absence of any regulations in place when supervisors stop supervising their students, that more effort should be put into mediating. The question of initiating mediation was raised, and while the Dean was reluctant to be to prescriptive, it was felt that more directive wording in relation to the role of the postgraduate Director of Teaching & Learning would be helpful. It was agreed that supervisor workshops for 2012/13 would include: *Introduction to Research Supervision* and *Effective Research Supervision*.

Funding available for College Awards (GS/12-13/05; 09)

It was confirmed that students are funded for 3 years only; however, the Trinity PhD is described as a 4-year degree. While students may apply for a further year's funding, receipt of this additional funding is subject to their School's funding availability. They may not be funded beyond the 4 years of their course. It was noted that students in receipt of income (including scholarship income) in excess of €18k would be liable for tax and.

HEA and the Structured PhD (GS/12-13/06)

The HEA has indicated to the Provost that core funding will only be allocated to students on structured PhDs. The Dean reminded the Committee that all Trinity PhD students were undertaking structured PhDs and that the structured component should include, regular monitoring of progress ad attendance at modules (disciplinespecific, generic and transferable skills). The Dean described the role of the Innovation Academy and the Graduate Certificate in Innovation & Entrepreneurship in providing transferable skills training to students registered in any discipline. The Dean emphasized that modules at the Innovation Academy were free to registered PhD students. The question of how best to market the Innovation Academy was raised and it was suggested that supervisors be given more information in order to encourage their students to actively participate. It was confirmed that members of the Academy Staff and the Student Ambassadors would be available to meet with staff and students in any school to provide information. The Committee discussed the possibility of stipulating a minimum ECTS for the Trinity PhD. A discussion on seminar participation as appropriate activity for PhD students was held although no credit is attached to this particular activity. The Dean requested postgraduate Directors of Teaching & Learning to send her an outline of any modules/structured activities that their Schools currently provide to support student development.

At a later Committee meeting, the Dean advised that if Schools wished they could prepare a module descriptor for the learning outcomes triage group and subsequent approval by the GSC which would enable ECTS to be assigned to these modules. She also stated that some Schools in the same faculty were in the process of developing a research skills module and that it would be worth exploring if some form of collaboration might be possible. The Committee approved a minimum of 10 ECTS for a PhD student to take over the course of their PhD. The Dean also noted that School of Computer Science & Statistics offered a tailored module for PhD students and that this type of module might be of interest to other Schools.

Postgraduate Student No.s (GS/12-13/14)

The Dean noted that College would be closely monitoring postgraduate student no.s for 2012/13 given the economic climate and also following comments by one School which had expressed concerns in relation to the dramatic drop in their postgraduate student no.s over previous years.

Science without Borders (GS/12-13/10; 016)

The International Education Manager at IUA gave an overview of the Science without Borders scheme, a joint initiative on the part of the Brazilian Ministry for Education (CAPES) and the Ministry for Science (CNPQ) which aimed at placing over 100,000 Brazilian students in HEIs overseas by the end of 2014. In 2012, two MOUs had been signed between SFI and CNPQ and between the HEA and CAPES to bring 800 postgraduate research students from Brazil to Ireland to undertake fully-

funded PhD programs. Two types of programmes would be offered: a PhD 'sandwich' programme for one year of study abroad, and a full PhD 4-year programme. While the scheme was originally established to support PhD training in the STEM areas, it also now includes the creative arts and technologies. The Dean urged Schools to provide details of the projects available to prospective students as students would be fully funded, including tuition, room and board, as well as costs toward English language support. Prospective students would be required to meet TCD entry requirements.

At a subsequent Committee meeting the Dean informed the Committee that over 200 TCD research project proposals had been submitted for the Brazilian Science without Borders scheme. These were being sent to the IUA for uploading to the designated portal and would also be uploaded to the GSO website.

TCD-UCD-QUB Joint Postgraduate Certificate in Innovation and Entrepreneurship (GS/12-13/11)

The Dean informed the Committee that QUB had been approved as a partner in the Innovation Academy and would have a role in the academic programme provided.

Inter-Institutional Agreement on Collaborative Graduate Programmes (GS/12-13/12)

The Dean outlines the administrative arrangements for postgraduate students registered at one institution and taking modules at another. It was noted that while modules may be made available to postgraduate research students for a fee, students on agreed inter-institutional thematic or structured PhD programmes would not necessarily be subject to payment of a fee in order to attend modules at a host institution.

Taught Master and the College Funding Process (GS/12-13/17)

The VP introduced the new funding model, the Annual Budgetary Cycle. She advised that due to a significant decline in the State Grant income the historic allocation of resources was no longer fit for purpose. She informed the Committee that 70% of core funding was allocated to staff costs. Under the Annual Budgetary Cycle, pay and non-pay budgets would be set in advance. She stated that a 1% transfer of the overall College budget had been made from the COO areas to the academic areas. She advised that each School would receive a primary allocation to cover costs, and a secondary allocation based on increased activity in relation to PGT courses and with investment for new initiatives.

Progression and Awards-Publication of Results (GS/12-13/18)

Members of the GeneSIS team updated the Committee on Stage 4 of the project which focused on the recording of results of academic assessment in the SITS system for all modules on Taught courses. They advised that there would also be 'Progression and Award' functionality for recording end of year results and award classifications. The Committee approved a no. of proposals listed in the circulated document in relation to the publication of student results and reports generated.

Guidelines on the Modification of Examination and Assessment Arrangements for Students with Disabilities (GS/12-13/20)

The Disability Officer circulated the document for discussion. He stated that the document had been amended to take into account changes to the College calendar in the previous academic year as well as the national Disability Advisors Working Network (DAWN), approved in 2012, "Policy, Guidelines and Procedures for the Granting of Reasonable Accommodations in Examinations to Students with Disabilities".

Dean of Students (GS/12-13/24)

The Dean of Students updated the Committee on a number of issues in relation to PG students. She stated that postgraduate students made up 1/3 of the student body and it was important to consider the postgraduate student experience as well as the undergraduate. She referred to College policy on student parent, carer and pregnancy. In addition, she reported on the Irish National Student Survey, a mandatory survey for all students as well as the provision of Orientation for postgraduate students.

Irish Research Council (GS/12-13/26)

The Dean reported that there had been a change to the Irish Research Council funding for research students. Funding to students on a structured PhD will now be available for 4 years, instead of 3. Students who have completed 1 year of a PhD programme may apply for an additional 3 years funding; however, students who have already completed 3 years may not apply for top-up funding. The Dean added that while IRC funding only covered EU students, non-EU students may still apply. The Dean informed the Committee that each School would be required to have a definition of their structured PhD, but that the IRC was permitting Deans of Graduate Studies to say whether sufficient structure exists across their PhD programmes.

Student Evaluation (GS/12-13/39)

The Dean reported that a recent institutional review raised concerns over the evaluation of students. A Working Group, chaired by the Vice Provost, had been set up. The Dean noted that the recommendation was that PGT students should be evaluated as previously approved by the GSC and Council. The Working Group recommended that feedback on PhD programmes be sought from research students. The Dean stated that the Working Group had begun to consider the implementation of the recommendations.

Fitness to Practice (GS/12-13/45)

The Dean of Students informed the Committee that the current Fitness to Practice Policy was agreed by University Council in May 2011 and an implementation document had been developed. It was suggested that there should be training or a workshop provided on this for Heads of Schools/Disciplines.

Student Charter (GS/12-13/46)

The GSU Vice President introduced the Student Charter which he said was an aspirational document outlining what students can expect from College, and what College could expect from students. Both the SU and GSU were involved in the development of the document which had been endorsed by Board.

New Courses 2012/13

Professional Diploma in Education (Further Education) (GS/12-13/25)

The Committee approved the course (NFQ Level 8) for submission to the University Council.

M.Phil. in Creative and Cultural Entrepreneurship (GS/12-13/47)

The Dean introduced Prof. Redmond who had been asked to develop this course. She reported that there was a similar course at Goldsmiths College in London. It was agreed that College would benefit from a partnership with Goldsmiths and subsequently it was agreed to develop a new Masters sharing teaching resources in partnership from September 2013 with a view to offering a joint award starting in 2014/15. Although there would be a partnership arrangement in the first year the long term plan is to develop a joint programme and this would be brought back to the GSC at a later stage.

Professional Masters in Education (GS/12-13/48)

The Dean reported that this course proposal was being brought for consideration as a result of requirements by the Teaching Council. The Teaching Council regulations specify that all programmes should be consistent throughout the sector. They are required to be 2 years full-time and Level 9 qualification. The Professional Masters in Education will be a required qualification for anyone wishing to work as post-primary school teachers in Ireland. The Committee approved the course for submission to University Council.

5. Processing and Admissions: Postgraduate Student and Course Numbers

As the first point of contact for all postgraduate students, the GSO advises all incoming students with regard to registration, financial information on fee payment, and immigration requirements (for non-EU applicants). The GSO organises the Orientation Meeting for new postgraduate students where they are advised on services available to them in College.

There have been approximately 23,000 enquiries per year over the past three years, either directly to the office over the phone or by email. In 2011/12, the Graduate Studies Office processed around seven thousand applications on line for postgraduate admission both taught and research. Some applications were submitted directly to Schools and, of these, 111 were made offers.

Table 1 illustrates fluctuations in the number of postgraduate students registered over the last nine years. In 2012/13 there has been a marked decrease of 391 students (-8.04%) who registered for the year on the postgraduate register in comparison to the 2011/12 year. The decrease affected both all new entrants to the postgraduate register and new entrants for the first time in TCD.

The following conclusions can be drawn from Table 2:

- In 2012/13 the number of postgraduate research students in both categories (full-time and part-time) had decreased by 376 registered students in comparison to 2011/12. In 2011/12 the number of postgraduate research students had increased by 63 in comparison to 2010/11.
- Research students constitute 42.9% of all postgraduate students in 2012/13 and 49.1% in 2011/12 compared to 45.5% in 2010/2011 and 42.7% in 2009/10.
- Research students make up 11.5% of the total student body of 16,646 in 2012/13 which is a decrease compared to 13.6% in 2011/12 and 13.3% in 2010/11.
- Of the 2,552 students registered for taught courses in 2012/13, 2,528 (56.5%) of all graduate students on the postgraduate register were undertaking a Masters degree and 24 (0.5%) were registered for a Postgraduate Diploma. Of the 2,373 students registered for taught courses in 2011/12, 1,857 (39.8%) of all graduate students on the postgraduate register were undertaking a Masters degree and 516 (11.1%) were registered for a Postgraduate Diploma compared to 1,712 (34.9%) on a Masters degree and 958 (19.5%) on a Postgraduate Diploma in 2010/11.
- Part-time student numbers increased in 2012/13 to 1,564 with 35% of all postgraduate students registering for part-time study. In 2011/12 part-time student numbers decreased to 1,456 with 31.2% of all postgraduate students registering for part-time study in comparison to 33.8% in 2010/11 and 37.5% in 2009/10. In 2012/13 and 2011/12 the majority of part-time students were undertaking Taught Masters and Postgraduate Diploma courses while the number of part-time research students was relatively low by comparison at 298 and 334 respectively. The part-time research numbers increased in 2011/12 but decreased in 2012/13.




Figure 1. Annual fluctuations of full-time and part-time students from 2008/09

Figure 1 illustrates that from the year 2008/09, the overall annual number of registered part-time students fluctuated from 2,187 in 2008/09 to 1,564 in 2012/13.

Appendix 4 provides comparative data for students' nationality for 2011/12 and 2010/11.

Of all the 4,863 students registered in 2011/12

- 112 (2.30%) students came from Africa compared to 100 (2.03%) students out of 4,903 in 2010/11 which indicates an annual increase of 12 students.
- 283 (5.8%) came from Asia compared to 272 (5.5%) in 2010/11 reflecting an annual increase of 11 students,
- 16 (0.3%) came from Australia and New Zealand compared to 18 (0.4%) in 2010/11 reflecting an annual decrease of 2 students.
- 275 (5.7%) came from North and Central America compared to 282 (5.8%) in 2010/11 reflecting an annual decrease of 7 students.
- 21 (0.4%) came from South America compared to 16 (0.3%) in 2010/11 reflecting an annual increase of 5 students.
- There was a decrease of 101 (2.9%) in the number of EU fee paying postgraduate students coming from Ireland from 3519 in 2010/11 to down to 3418 in 2011/12.
- There were 687 (16.7%) non Irish EU fee paying students from the EU countries in 2011/12 compared to 646 (15.5%) in 2010/11 which indicates a slight proportional increase and in numerical terms there has also been an increase of 41 students.
- 51(1%) came from the non EU countries in Europe in 2011/12 compared to 50 (1%) in 2010/11 reflecting an increase of 1 student.

Similar to 2010/11 there are 13 countries from which at least 20 students came to study in Trinity in 2011/12 i.e. the United States of America (213, 226 in 2010/11), Great Britain (219, 185 in 2010/11), Germany (92, 94 in 2010/11), Italy (89, 86 in 2010/11), China (75, 79 in 2010/11), India (82, 68 in 2010/11), Poland (59, 63 in 2010/11), Canada (51, 42 in 2010/11), France (34, 40 in 2010/11), Spain (31, 31 in 2010/11), Nigeria (36, 36 in 2010/11), Greece (24, 27 in 2010/11) and Pakistan (26, 20 in 2010/11). These 1031 (997 students in 2010/11) represent 21.2% of total postgraduate students.

Appendix 4 provides comparative data for students' nationality for 2012/13 and 2011/12.

Of all the 4,472 students registered in 2012/13

- 104 (2.3%) students came from Africa compared to 112 (2.30%) students out of 4,863 in 2011/12 which indicates an annual decrease of 8 students.
- 320 (7.2%) came from Asia compared to 283 (5.8%) in 2011/12 reflecting an annual increase of 37 students.
- 21 (0.5%) came from Australia and New Zealand compared to 16 (0.3%) in 2011/12 reflecting an annual increase of 5 students.
- 254 (5.7%) came from North and Central America compared to 275 (5.7%) in 2011/12 reflecting an annual decrease of 21 students.
- 21 (0.5%) came from South America similar to 21 (0.4%) in 2011/12.
- There was a decrease of 312 (9.1%) in the number of EU fee paying postgraduate student coming from Ireland from 3418 in 2011/12 down to 3106 in 2012/13.
- There were 602 (16.2%) non Irish EU fee paying students from the EU countries in 2012/13 compared to 687 (16.7%) in 2011/12 which indicates an annual decrease of 85 students.
- 44 (1%) came from the non EU countries in Europe in 2012/13 compared to 51 (1%) in 2011/12 reflecting a decrease of 7 students.
- There are 14 countries from which at least 20 students came to study in Trinity in 2012/13 i.e. the United States of America (186, 213 in 2011/12), Great Britain (190, 219 in 2011/12), Germany (93, 92 in 2011/12), Italy (65, 89 in 2011/12), China (96, 75 in 2011/12), India (86, 82 in 2011/12), Poland (50, 59 in 2011/12), Canada (53, 51 in 2011/12), France (41, 34 in 2011/12), Spain (19, 31 in 2011/12), Nigeria (25, 36 in 2011/12), Greece (20, 24 in 2011/12), Pakistan (20, 26 in 2011/12), and Saudi (20, 6 in 2011/12). These 964 (1031 students in 2011/12) represent 21.6% of total postgraduate students.

Table 3 below shows the breakdown of students by gender registered on Research, Masters and Postgraduate Diploma programmes in 2011/12 and 2012/13 indicating that there has been a steady decrease in the number of male and female students since 2009/10.

Tables 4-6 (below) illustrate a breakdown of student numbers between three Faculty Groupings, the data illustrates that in 2011/12

- The number of female research students has increased by 43 (3.9%) in comparison to the previous year and the number of males has increased by 20 students (1.8%)
- the highest percentage of male research students i.e. 51.7% (594 out of all registered research males in 2011/12), compared to 51.8% (585 students in 2010/11) are registered in Engineering, Mathematics and Science
- the highest percentage of female research students i.e. 48% (551 out of all registered research females in 2011/12), compared to 47.4% (523 students in 2010/11), are registered in Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences
- overall, fewer males than females register on taught courses; although there
 was an increase of 61 male students from 645 in 2010/10 to 706 in 2011/2012
 registered on the Masters degree courses, which can be compared to the
 corresponding increase of 84 females from 1067 in 2010/11 to 1151 in
 2011/2012
- With respect to Postgraduate Diploma students, the overall number of males decreased further in 2011/12 from 328 to 216. Eighty four more females (300) registered on a postgraduate diploma course than males (216) in 2011/12. However, the number of females decreased further by 330 students i.e. 52.4% from 2010/11.

And the academic year 2012/13

- The number of female research students has decreased by 179 (15.6%) in comparison to the previous year and the number of males has decreased by 197 students (17.1%),
- the highest percentage of male research students i.e. 50.5% (481 out of all registered research males in 2012/13), compared to 51.7% (594 students in 2011/12) are registered in Engineering, Mathematics and Science
- the highest percentage of female research students i.e. 48.9% (473 out of all registered research females in 2012/13), compared to 48% (551 students in 2011/12), are registered in Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences,
- overall, fewer males than females register on taught courses; although there
 was an increase of 289 male students from 706 in 2011/2012 to 995 in
 2012/13 registered on the Masters degree courses, which can be compared
 to the corresponding increase of 406 females from 1151 in 2011/2012 to 1557
 in 2012/13
- With respect to Postgraduate Diploma students, the overall number of male and female students increased by 30 from 516 in 2011/12 to 546 in 2012/13 representing an overall increase of 5.8%.



Postgraduate Taught Courses

The number of postgraduate taught courses has risen steadily from 2010/2011 to 2012/2013. There were 195 separate courses of study in 2012/2013 as compared to 186 in 2011/2012 and 171 in 2010/11. The number of taught programmes has increased by 43.4% over the previous ten years. Occasionally, entry to some courses may be suspended for a given year for academic or resource-related reasons. Additionally, some courses may only have an intake on a biennial basis.




Figure 2. Number of Taught Masters and Postgraduate Diploma courses from 2002/2003

6. Taught Postgraduate Courses – Overview of Student Numbers

An overview of student numbers on taught postgraduate courses (M.Phil. / M.Sc. / PG Dip.) in 2011/12 shows that a number of courses in all three Faculties are operating below optimal capacity, with fewer than 10 students.

- 96 courses across the three Faculties ran with fewer than 10 students, constituting 49% of the total number offered
- 35 courses in Health Sciences had fewer than 10 students (63%)
- 8 courses in Engineering, Mathematics and Science had fewer than 10 students (28%).
- The Faculty of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences had the highest number of courses with fewer than 10 students, comprising 48% of 110 courses on offer.

An overview of student numbers on taught postgraduate courses (M.Phil. / M.Sc. / PG Dip.) in 2012/13 shows that a number of courses in all three Faculties are operating below optimal capacity, with fewer than 10 students.

- 103 courses across the three Faculties ran with fewer than 10 students, constituting 51% of the total number offered
- 34 courses in Health Sciences had fewer than 10 students (61%)
- 13 courses in Engineering, Mathematics and Science had fewer than 10 students (41%).
- The Faculty of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences had the highest number of courses with fewer than 10 students, comprising 50% of 56 courses on offer.

7. Maintenance of Academic Quality

Academic quality of graduate education is monitored by external examiners who play different functions depending on their role, either to assess taught courses or to examine research theses of individual students.

• Taught Courses – External Examiners

Most external examiners are appointed for a three-year period; although for some part-time courses examiners are appointed for four years. All external examiners for taught courses must complete a standard course assessment form for the first two years of their tenure and, in their final year, are required to complete a more extensive report.

In addition, the academic integrity and overall quality of all new postgraduate Masters course proposals are reviewed by external academic assessors, internationally recognised experts in their discipline, before submissions are made to the University Council for approval.

• Research Degrees

An external examiner is appointed by the Dean of Graduate Studies to provide an independent academic assessment of each student's research thesis.

The list of external examiners, as approved by the Sub-committee of Board and Council for Higher Degrees, is provided in Appendix 5a for the academic year 2011/12 and Appendix 5b for the academic year 2012/13. In 2011/12 there were 127 External Examiners engaged by the Faculty of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences, 89 by Health Sciences and 157 by Engineering, Mathematics and Science. In 2012/13 there were 152 External Examiners engaged by the Faculty of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences, 117 by Health Sciences and 189 by Engineering, Maths and Science.

The results of the approved research and professional degree examinations are given in Appendix 2, along with comparative data for the five preceding years.


While a substantial number of theses are awarded "as it stands" (11.5% in 2011/12 and 7.8% in 2012/13), the majority (79.5% in 2011/12 and 84.5% in 2012/13) are approved subject to "minor corrections". In cases where a thesis falls below the accepted standard for the award of the degree, major revisions are usually requested (8.8% in 2011/12 and 7.2% in 2012/13). Students must register for a 6-month revision period before re-submitting the revised thesis for re-examination, the outcome of which is almost always a greatly improved thesis.




Figure 3. Examination period (in terms of months) of research theses inclusive of theses referred for major revision (when relevant)

Figure 3 shows the time taken from first submission of the thesis to approval by the Sub-committee of Board and Council for Higher Degrees. This period includes the time taken to

- (i) nominate examiners
- (ii) appoint examiners and send the theses to them
- (iii) arrange a *viva* (if required)

- (iv) receive the examiners reports
- (v) make a decision and inform the student
- (vi) complete revisions
- (vii) bring recommendations to the Sub-committee for Higher Degrees (a Sub-committee of Board and Council.

There are a number of points in the sometimes-lengthy thesis examination process where backlogs can occur. In 2012/13 the majority of students progress from examination to confirmation by Board and Council within 6 months 48.7%, (48.8% in 2011/12) while most remaining students complete the process within 12 months 45.9% (46% in 2011/12). A small percentage 5.3% (5.1% in 2011/12) of theses examinations take up to 25months to complete. The Graduate Studies office reviews the administrative processes regularly and proactively works with the College offices to streamline systems and improve efficiencies.

8. Publications

The GSO is responsible for the production of three major publications and sources of information. These are the *University Calendar Part 2 for Graduate Studies and Higher Degrees, the Postgraduate Prospectus* and the Graduate Studies Office website.

• The University of Dublin Calendar Part 2 for 2011/12 and 2012/13

The *University Calendar Part 2* contains the rules governing the academic progress and conduct of all postgraduate students, both taught and research. Since 1999/00 the *Calendar Part 2* has included the set of general regulations applicable to all postgraduate students, as well as more detailed regulations relating to students undertaking research and taught courses. This largely eliminates the need to refer to the *Calendar Part 1* for postgraduate matters. Offprints of the *Calendar Part 2* are given to all staff and all postgraduate students at registration and are now sent, *gratis*, to all universities in Ireland. There were 6,500 copies of the *Calendar Part 2* printed in 2008/09; 6,500 in 2009/10; 6,500 in 2010/11.

Postgraduate Prospectus 2012 and 2013

Since 1998 the *Postgraduate Prospectus* has been the primary printed form of publicity produced by the GSO for graduate students. It is distributed *gratis* to all intending applicants and all academic staff of the College. It is also sent to all universities in Ireland and the U.K., as well as to a selection of major institutions in Europe and elsewhere. In 2010/2011, the GSO also produced an e-book and CD version of the prospectus.

The Graduate Studies Office established Facebook and Twitter pages as an innovative and cost-effective way to reach prospective students from all around the world. They provide an excellent forum for GSO to communicate information on new courses, scholarship opportunities, upcoming events, etc to an international audience.

• Strategic Innovation Fund (SIF)

SIF I: The Dean of Graduate Studies continued to coordinate the College's postgraduate participation in the SIF I initiative to develop generic training modules for research students, in collaboration with UCC and NUIG. Several events were run for six inter-institutional high-level generic modules, which can be incorporated into Ph.D. student programmes at the partner institutions. TCD coordinated two modules on "Research Ethics" and "Statistics and Data Analysis", and participated in four other modules led by NUIG ("Commercialisation of Research and Technology Transfer" and "Information Literacy") and by UCC ("Research Methods for the Life Sciences" and "Teaching and Learning Skills").

SIF II: As part of the Graduate Education strand under the SIF2 Dublin Region Higher Education Alliance (DRHEA) project, several schools in College developed, in collaboration with UCD, DCU, NUIM, DIT and ITT, advanced Ph.D. modules in a number of disciplines. The strand also coordinates an annual conference. Despite funding cuts, significant progress has been made. The Dean serves on the steering committee for this programme.

Fourth Level Network

The Dean of Graduate Studies continues to represent Trinity College Dublin on the IUA's Fourth Level Network, which has proved to be a very successful forum for collaboration and communication between the Deans of Graduate Studies from the 7 Universities.

 National Academy for the Integration of Research, Teaching and Learning (NAIRTL)

The Dean of Graduate Studies continues to represent Trinity College Dublin on the NAIRTL working group for supervisor training which is developing shared resources to support academic staff with the supervision of research students.

Postgrad Ireland Awards

In 2010/11 the MSc in Computer Science (Networks and Distributed Systems) won Postgraduate Course of the Year in the IT Category. The M.Sc. in Neuroscience was also commended in the Sciences category.

• The Innovation Academy

The TCD-UCD Innovation Academy is the educational centerpiece of the Innovation Alliance between TCD and UCD. It is a collaborative venture in Ph.D. education that builds on existing resources and synergies between TCD and UCD. Its mission is to

develop a new breed of creative graduate, expert in their discipline, with a thorough understanding of how innovation can convert knowledge and ideas rapidly into products, services and policies for economic and social benefit.



10. Postgraduate Admissions Data 2012/13 and 2013/14

Postgraduate admissions data have been incorporated in the GSO Annual Report since 2004, and include detailed admissions data for both research degrees and taught courses for the academic year 2011/12 and 2012/13 with information on the gender, fee status (EU/Non-EU), and delivery format (full-/part-time) of applicants.

The data presented in Appendix 6 show applications to the research register by School for entry in 2012/13 and registered research students by School.

In 2012/13 there were 455 students registered on year 1 of the register – this represents a decrease of 87 students on the previous year. Of these students, 16.7% are registered with the School of Medicine, 9% with the School of Psychology and 8% with the School of Engineering.

The total number of registered research students as of 31st January 2013 was 1920. Of this number, the majority (or 70%) are within the timescale of 2 years for Masters/4 years for Ph.D. for which HEA funding is available. The total number of students who fall outside the recommended timescale is 126, or 6.6% of total registered research students (compared to 219, or 9.3% in 2011/12 and 248 or 11.6% in 2010/11)

The breakdown of registered students into EU and non-EU fee categories indicates that 87.8% of research students (1,686) are categorised as EU for fee purposes, and 12.2% (234) non-EU.

Application data for the academic year 2012/12 and 2013/14 for postgraduate taught, doctorate, research and visiting applications processed through the new student information system are presented in Appendix 7a-7d and 8a-8d (It is important to note that 2012/13 data is collated from the new student information system (SITS), it does not include data from PAC or direct entry).

The data presented in Appendix 7a (2013/14) show applications to postgraduate taught courses in year 1 for new entrants as of the end of February 2013. Three thousand six hundred and twenty two (3,622) taught applications have been received by the GSO *via* SITS. Of the 3,622 applications received for taught courses (Masters and P.Grad.Dips) via SITS, 84.20% (2,078 students) accepted the offer (of the 2,421 applications received via SITS in 2012/13 1,845 (94.6%) accepted the offer) and 1,804 of these students had registered by end of February 2013.

The breakdown of registered students into EU and non-EU fee categories indicates that 84.6% of taught course students (1,526) are categorised as EU for fee purposes, and 15.4% (278) non-EU.

The data presented in Appendix 7b (2013/14) show applications to postgraduate doctorate courses in year 1 for new entrants as of the end of February 2013. Six hundred and seventy three (673) doctorate applications have been received by the GSO *via* SITS. Of the 673 applications received for doctorate courses via SITS, 93.7% (473 students) accepted the offer. Three hundred and seventy five (375) of these students had registered by end of February 2013.

The breakdown of registered students into EU and non-EU fee categories indicates that 83.5% of taught course students (313) are categorised as EU for fee purposes, and 16.5% (62) non-EU.

The data presented in Appendix 7c (2013/14) show applications to postgraduate research courses in year 1 for new entrants as of the end of February 2013. Seventy four (74) research applications have been received by the GSO *via* SITS. Of the 74 applications received for research via SITS, 92.50% (49 students) accepted the offer. Fourty (40) of these students had registered by end of February 2013.

The breakdown of registered students into EU and non-EU fee categories indicates that 90% of research course students (36) are categorised as EU for fee purposes, and 10% (4) non-EU.

The data presented in Appendix 7d (2013/14) show applications to postgraduate visiting courses in year 1 for new entrants as of the end of February 2013. Sixty six (66) visiting applications have been received by the GSO *via* SITS. Of the 66 applications received for visiting courses via SITS, 98.5% (65 students) accepted the offer. Fifty five (55) of these students had registered by end of February 2013.

The breakdown of registered students into EU and non-EU fee categories indicates that 83.6% of visiting students (46) are categorised as EU for fee purposes, and 16.4% (9) non-EU.

11a. Research Students – Funding sources

Appendix 9a indicates that in 2012/13 of the 2,306 registered research students a little over half (1,349) were in receipt of some funding. The Faculty of Engineering, Mathematics and Science has the highest proportion of funded students with some 72.7% of students in receipt of funding. 50.3% of students in Faculty Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences have some funding and in the Faculty of Health Sciences 47.9% receive some funding toward their research degree.

Analysis of the data extracted indicates that 986 of our registered research students have no specified funding source. Whilst some of these students may be in receipt of assistance from their employers the majority are wholly self-financing. Some points of interest by faculty are as follows:

Faculty AHSS

Of the 459 students in receipt of funding in this faculty 31.6% (145) receive their funding from a research account; college award or departmental account. The remaining 68.4% are in receipt of Government of Ireland awards or other funding such as SUSI, local authorities foreign governments etc..

The School of Social Sciences and Philosophy has the highest proportion of funded students with 73% of its students funded in some way. The School of Education fares least well with only 24% of its students in receipt of any funding.

Faculty EMS

More than half of the 898 research students in the Faculty EMS are in receipt of funding and of the 653 funded students, 77.2% (504) receive their funding from a research account; college award or departmental account. The remaining 22.8% are in receipt of Government of Ireland awards or other funding.

The School of Physics has the highest proportion of funded students with 92% of its students funded in some way. The School of Computer Science and Statistics fares least well with only 52% of its students in receipt of any funding

Faculty HS

The Faculty of Health Science has the lowest percentage of funded students 47.9% of total research student body.

The School of Dental Science has the highest proportion of funded students with 71% of its students funded in some way. The School of Medicine fares least well with only 42% of its students in receipt of any funding.

11b. Postgraduate Taught Course Students – Funding

Appendix 9b indicates that in 2012/13 of the 2,463 registered taught course students 568 (23.1%) were in receipt of funding. The main source of funding for taught postgraduate students is "other funding" such as SUSI, local authorities foreign governments etc..

An analysis of the data indicates that whilst the Faculty of AHSS has the highest number of taught postgraduate students (54% of PG taught course students are registered in this faculty), only 24% of them are in receipt of any funding. Students in the Faculty of Engineering, Mathematics and Science are in receipt of 14% of funding and students in the Faculty of Health Science are in receipt of 29% funding.
