Topic: Hannah Arendt & the Ancients

Module Outline:

Hannah Arendt's love of ancient philosophy and her extensive knowledge of ancient Greek has led many to characterize her as a grecophile. The purpose of this module is to see whether or not this is an accurate depiction of Arendt. To this end, we will read excerpts from Plato's and Aristotle's texts that Arendt explicitly and implicitly draws on in order to develop her political thought. First, we will tease out the Platonic and Aristotelian influences on Arendt's conception of the *vita activa* (the active life). Second, we will analyze the Socratic and Aristotelian influences on Arendt's conception of the *vita contemplativa* (the contemplative life).
