The Scholar's Guide to Trinity Monday

It is going to be a hectic day for the New Scholars, so here is a quick guide to what is happening around you and a few bits of advice. Today, Trinity Monday, is one of the highlights of the College year and there are plenty of things happening.

Be aware of one thing straight away: as a new Scholar you will be attending a formal (black tie) dinner in the Dining Hall tonight at 8.00 pm, with an important photography session beforehand at 7.15 pm in the Exam Hall where you will join 'Scholars of the Decades' from 2014, 2004, 1994, 1984 and so on. It is a busy day, and somewhere in there, you must make sure to acquire suitable clothing. Your free time today will be roughly 2.00 pm to 3.15 pm and 4.30 pm to 7.00 pm.

So, what keeps you so busy all day? As you can see from the day's plan on page four, there are plenty of things planned, including a service of Commemoration and Thanksgiving in the Chapel immediately following the announcement of new Scholars and Fellows; a memorial discourse by Professor Werner Blau, Fellow Emeritus, School of Physics on Professor Brian Henderson and Professor Daniel Bradley in the GMB; the Provost's reception either in her Garden (weather permitting) or in the Exam Hall at 1.00 pm; the traditional game of marbles on the Chapel steps between Scholars and Fellows directly afterwards; Afternoon Tea and a meeting with the Registrar of Chambers in the Conversation Room, GMB at 3.30 pm; the Scholars of the Decades photograph and Trinity Monday Dinner in the Exam Hall and Dining Hall, respectively, starting at 7.15 pm sharp.

For all these events, you will require a gown. To rent one, go to Room 50 in the Atrium by following the path behind the Chapel away from the entrance to the Buttery.

You will also require the gown for the swearing-in ceremony of the new Scholars, which takes place in the Provost's House on Tuesday 23 April at 11.00 am sharp. Meet in Front Square, outside the entrance to the Exam Hall, at 10.45 am, to be taken through House 1 to the Provost's House.

Declaration to be made by incoming Scholars

The swearing-in ceremony of the new Scholars takes place on Tuesday 23 April at 11.00 am

I shall willingly and diligently obey the Provost in all legitimate and honourable matters. I accept all of the aforementioned conditions and pledge that I shall conscientiously abide by them.

Entitlements

Having come through the tough process of obtaining Scholarship, it is now time to get information on your entitlements as a Scholar. More information is given later in this booklet, but here are the essential details. You can also find a Scholarship Frequently Asked Questions page on the website at www.tcd.ie/students/scholars/faq/.

As a Scholar of Trinity College, you may receive the following entitlements for the duration of your Scholarship:

- Commons free of Charge
- College Rooms free of charge (except for utility fee) for up to 9 months of the year
- Tuition fees paid (postgraduate fees covered also), including the 'Registration Fee'*
- Annual salary of €253.95 (€250 to the Scholar, €3.95 to the Scholars' Committee)

*Undergraduate scholars from non-EU countries shall have their fees reduced by an amount corresponding to the appropriate fee level of an Irish student.

Tuition Fees

When you register for your course in September/October, your form should indicate that you are a Scholar and that your fees have been paid, or, in the case of Scholars from non-EU countries, that the fees have been reduced. If this is not the case, contact the Financial Services Division.

Commons

Commons is a three-course meal usually served in the East Dining Hall in the evening on Mondays-Thursdays and 1:05 pm on Fridays during term. It is attended free of charge by Scholars and Fellows, while members of the College community may attend by purchasing a ticket from the College's Catering Office at the rear of the Dining Hall, or by emailing commons@tcd.ie with preferred dates indicating guest numbers.

To attend Commons you must sign in online before 3.00 pm each day using the Commons sign-in website - www.tcdlife.ie/scholars. Your username and password to log in to the website will be provided by the Registrar of Chambers. You can sign in up to five days in advance. There is a fine for Scholars signing in and failing to attend Commons. Attendance is recorded, so please bring your ID card with you.

Grace and Waiterships

Grace is said before and after Commons by a Scholar. Ten Scholars are selected for this duty for the year and are paid a salary every quarter for doing so. Grace is said from memory, in Latin; a copy of Grace and a rough translation appear in the appendix to this booklet. All attendees at Commons stand for Grace and remain standing after the meal until the Fellows have passed on their way out. Typically, ten Scholars are given Waiterships each year. To volunteer, either register your interest with the Secretary of Scholars or email the Scholars' Secretary during week commencing 22 April 2024.

Rooms

Scholars are entitled to rooms for up to nine months of the year, typically from early September to early May. Arrangements are made to accommodate those students who need to take up rooms early in the year (for example, dental and medical students), and Scholars remain in rooms until after their last exam in May. Scholars **do** pay the utility charge during the year. As a new Scholar, you can now apply for a room in Trinity Hall for the next academic year. Please **do so this week** using the following web page <https://accommodation.tcd.ie/StudentBookings/>

If you have already applied for rooms for the coming academic year, it will not be possible to make a second application – contact the Accommodation Office by emailing hazel.kinmonth@tcd.ie to have your application amended. If you will be away for part of the year next year but would like to apply for rooms, please contact the Accommodation Office, as it will be possible to claim cash in lieu of rooms for that part of the year for which you are absent (see next page).

Annual Salary and Cash in Lieu of Entitlements

Scholars are granted an annual 'salary' of €253.95. Scholars may also decline the option of rooms and instead accept cash in lieu of rooms, which amounts to €2,215.00, paid in three instalments over the year, on 20th December, 20th March and 20th June. This claim does not go through the Accommodation Office. A Scholar's Emoluments form is sent out by the Financial Services Division each September, and Scholars can opt to claim for cash in lieu of rooms on this form. The first payment is made by 20th December and comprises the Annual Salary, Waiters Salary and the first of three payments for cash in lieu of rooms where applicable. The other two payments are made in March and June. Cash in lieu of Commons may also be granted, though only in exceptional circumstances. A Scholar can apply for Cash in lieu of Commons by emailing cdeans@tcd.ie before 1st September. Cash in lieu of commons is granted at the discretion of the Junior Dean. This amounts to €254, paid in four instalments over the year, on 20th December, 20th March, 20th June and 20th September.

Intermission of Scholarship

If you do not wish to take up your entitlements for an academic year, you may be able to intermit your Scholarship. The Scholarship lasts for a maximum of five years, though a Scholar can apply to intermit their tenure for one year by outlining their reasons in an email to studcase@tcd.ie if currently engaged in undergraduate study or otherwise to pgcases@tcd.ie. Intermission of Scholarship is granted at the discretion of the Senior Lecturer, if engaged in undergraduate study or otherwise the Dean of Graduate Studies. A maximum of three intermitted years is allowed. This would be particularly useful to those new Scholars who will be spending the next year abroad or taking a year out after graduating. Alternatively, students who are studying abroad next year are officially registered here at Trinity and may claim cash in lieu of rooms as outlined above. The deadline for intermission of Scholarship is normally 1st March prior to the academic year for which intermission is being sought. This deadline is waived in the case of new Scholars, however if you are considering intermitting next year, you should apply as soon as possible. Please inform the Accommodation Office of all intermissions. It is important to note that Scholars who are not registered with College and without an intermission will lose all their scholarship privileges (not just one year). Students who plan to go off-books need to apply to go off-books and apply to intermit their scholarship. These are two separate processes. If you go off-books and do not intermit, you will lose your Scholarship.

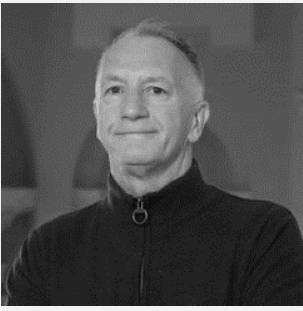

Dr Linda Doyle

Provost

The chief executive of the College, the Provost is elected for a ten-year term and acts as Chair of University Council and of the Board. Overseeing the development of College during her term, the Provost is ultimately responsible for just about everything that happens in College.



Dr Mary McAleese

Chancellor of the University

The figurehead of the University, of which Trinity is the sole constituent College, the Chancellor is the head of the Senate, the part of the University which awards degrees, made up of all Masters and Doctors of the College.



Prof Orla Sheils

Vice-Provost / Chief Academic Officer

The Vice-Provost is the senior academic officer with responsibility for the academic affairs of the university. Prof Sheils assists the Provost and takes her place when necessary and has a strong role in College's strategic planning.



Prof Neville Cox

Registrar

Keeper of the records of College, the Registrar oversees any changes to the Calendar and the Statutes of College.



Orla Cunningham

Chief Operating Officer

Heads College Administration and Support Services. This role entails providing strategic leadership in the overall development and management of these services to ensure alignment to the overall strategic objectives of College.



Victoria Butler

Secretary to the College / Director of Governance

Involved in many areas of College, the Secretary oversees university governance, compliance and legal matters.



Prof Eleanor Denny

Bursar & Director of Strategic Innovation

The Bursar and Director of Strategic Innovation has responsibilities regarding financial and related affairs of the College. This role entails providing strategic leadership in the overall development of the campus and administrative services to ensure alignment to the overall strategic objectives of the University.

Previous Scholars of Trinity College Dublin

The institution of Scholarship in Trinity is one steeped in history and tradition. (At the back of this booklet you will find a copy of the poem 'Twenty Years After', written on the occasion of a Scholar's return for the Trinity Monday dinner twenty years after being elected a Scholar, as much because it is now traditional to pass on that poem as for any poetic merit!). Some of the previous Scholars of Trinity College include:

Lenny Abrahamson (Sch. 1988) – award-winning film and television director

Samuel Beckett (Sch. 1925) – Celebrated novelist, playwright and poet, awarded the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1969 and elected Saoi of Aosdána in 1984

The Honourable Mr Justice Declan Budd (Sch. 1968) – High Court Judge and former president of the Law Reform Commission

Edmund Burke (Sch. 1746) – Statesman, author, orator and political philosopher

Ambassador John HF Campbell (Sch. 1959) – Former Irish Ambassador to UN and EU

Conor Cruise-O'Brien (Sch. 1938) – Writer, politician and academic

Sir William Rowan Hamilton (Sch. 1825) – mathematical genius, appointed Professor before he graduated! Developed the theory of quaternions, among other achievements.

Prof Declan Kiberd (Sch. 1971) – Literary theorist, author and journalist; Chair of Anglo-Irish Literature and Drama in UCD

Former Senator David Norris (Sch. 1966) – Civil rights campaigner, Joycean Scholar and politician

Dr Mary Robinson (Sch. 1965) – Chancellor of the University, former President of Ireland and former UN High Commissioner for Human Rights

Oscar Wilde (Sch. 1873) – Victorian playwright, novelist, poet and celebrated wit.

Whatever your discipline, there is a good chance that some of the Trinity academics and faculty members in your area are past Scholars too.

Foundation and Non-Foundation Scholarships

Many of you will notice that you have been elected as a Non-Foundation Scholar, as opposed to the few who have gained a Foundation Scholarship (these are sometimes known as ‘Scholars of the House’). In reality, there is very little difference.

Historically, Scholars are as old as the College itself – three Scholars are even named in the Foundation Charter of 1592. For a time, no students other than those who gained a Scholarship were allowed to enrol, and when the number of students was increased the number of Scholars was fixed at 70, in the Charter of Charles I of 1637. This number of 70 ‘Foundation’ Scholars remains fixed to this day. Non-Foundation Scholarships were initiated in the nineteenth century primarily to deal with problems that had arisen over religious beliefs. Students who failed to attend Chapel were considered ineligible for Scholarship at the time. Non-Foundation Scholarships were thus established to allow the award of Scholarships to Catholics and Dissenters. Upon admission to College in the early twentieth century, women could also only attain Non-Foundation Scholarships, though this was changed in the late 1960s.

Both classes of Scholars are entitled to the same emoluments. The only real difference between the classes is that Foundation Scholars are considered to be part of the Body Corporate, the legal governing body of College, along with the Fellows, the Provost and the Board. (For most matters of importance affecting College, responsibility lies with the Board for issues of finance and strategic planning and with University Council for more academically oriented issues.) Occasionally, the Foundation Scholars may be asked for their opinion or to vote on matters affecting College, though this has only been an issue once in the last twenty years.

Use of Rooms during the Long Vacation

Undergraduate Scholars can stay in rooms until the day after their final examination. If they have to extend for oral exams they can do so when notified of the exams. Health Sciences Scholars can extend until the time when their clinical modules end. This also applies at the other end of the summer for early entry into rooms when clinical attendance begins. Scholarship covers this period of tenancy.

Scholars may apply for summer residency for one summer of their Scholarship. There is a limited number of rooms, and priority is given as follows:

1. PhD students in their final or penultimate summer
2. Masters in research students in final or penultimate summer
3. Registered students of taught Masters programmes in final year
4. Registered students on Undergraduate programmes doing summer research

Please note that Trinity Hall residents, if successful, will be allocated in Trinity Hall.

A Supervisor's letter outlining the work to be done during the summer must accompany the application. Without this, the application will not be considered.

Postgraduate Studies

Upon completion of their primary degree, Scholars are encouraged to pursue further study here at Trinity College. The emoluments granted to a postgraduate Scholar are essentially the same as those for an undergraduate one: reduced fees, free Commons, a small salary and on-campus accommodation. Those wishing to work or gain experience in their field before continuing with postgraduate studies in their field are permitted to intermit their Scholarship for one or more years. In the same way that the March deadline for intermission is waived for incoming Scholars, late applications for intermission from Scholars who have just completed their primary degree will also be accepted.

Tenure

Your tenure as a Scholar lasts for up to five years, with the possibility of taking up to three years off by intermitting your Scholarship on a yearly basis.

Graduate Scholars are entitled to Commons free of charge for the rest of their Scholarship. Graduates undertaking an approved course of study or research elsewhere are entitled to Commons and their annual salary. Graduates undertaking an approved course of study or research here at Trinity are entitled to the full emoluments package.

The tenure of any Scholarship shall terminate by effluxion of time, where a Scholar without intermission ceases to be a student of the College, fails to maintain normal academic progress, dies, or resigns.

Seanad Electoral Register

The Seanad, the upper house of parliament or senate in Ireland, consists of sixty members chosen by various methods. Graduates of the University of Dublin elect three members. If you are an Irish citizen aged over 18, you are also entitled to vote in these elections. The last day to add new names to the Register is 26 February in any year and the new Register is published annually on 1 June. If you wish to apply for inclusion on the Register, please see: tcd.ie/academicregistry/graduation/seanad-eireann/seanad-form/.

Grace

Below is the full text of Grace as it is to be repeated, from memory, by the Waiters before and after Commons. Also provided is a rough translation into English.

Before Meal:

‘Oculi Omnium in te sperant Domine. Tu das iis escam eorum in tempore opportuno. Aperis tu manum tuam, et imples omne animal benedictione tua. Miserere nostri te quaesumus Domine, tuisque donis quae de tua benignitate sumus percepturi, benedicito per Christum Dominum nostrum’.

The eyes of all hope in you, Lord. You give to them food at the appropriate time. You open your hand, and you fill every creature with your blessing. Pity us, we beg you, Lord, and bless the gifts which we are about to receive from your bounty through Christ our Lord.

After Meal:

To you praise, to you honour, to you glory, O blessed and glorious Trinity. May the name of the Lord be blessed both now and forever. We praise you, most bountiful Father, for the most serene ones, Queen Elizabeth the founder of this College, James, its most generous builder, Charles its preserver, and our other benefactors, asking you, as we make use of these your gifts rightly and for your glory at this time, that we might exalt in you together with the faithful happily in the future, through Christ our Lord.
