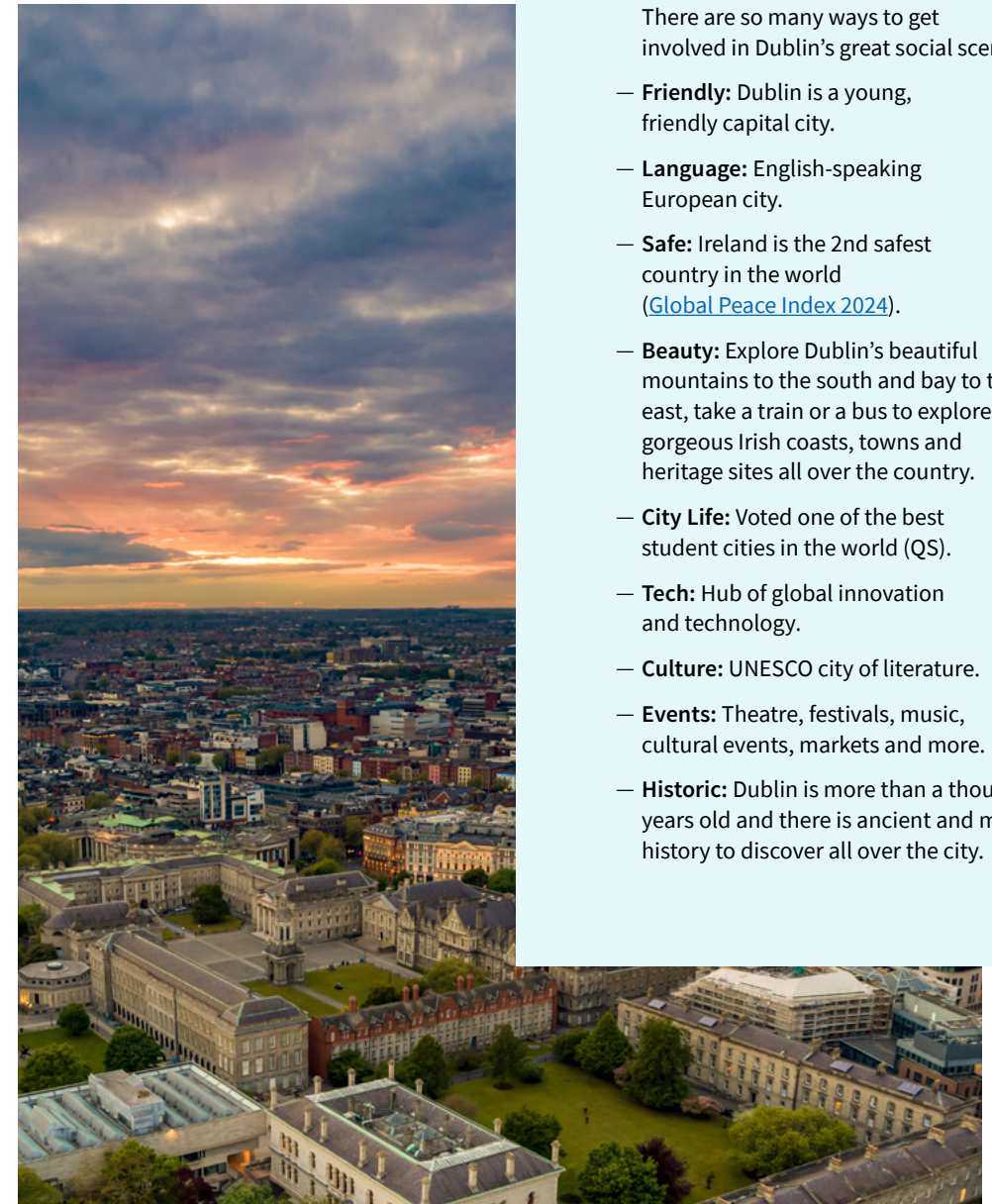


Discover Dublin

Studying at Trinity

When to Study Abroad

Trinity welcomes visiting students for a semester or year. Visiting students refers to both exchange and fee-paying study abroad students. Students are welcomed to attend for the Autumn semester only, Spring semester only, or for the full academic year.

What Can I Study at Trinity

Visiting students at Trinity apply to up to five areas of study from across Trinity's three faculties and enroll in modules (classes) from their admitted areas of study on arrival. The non-EU admissions team will be in touch with students with instructions on module enrolment. Please review the list of areas of study on the next page very carefully, as well as any special requirements for specific areas of study, as **you will not be able to enroll in modules outside of your admitted areas of study.**

Credit

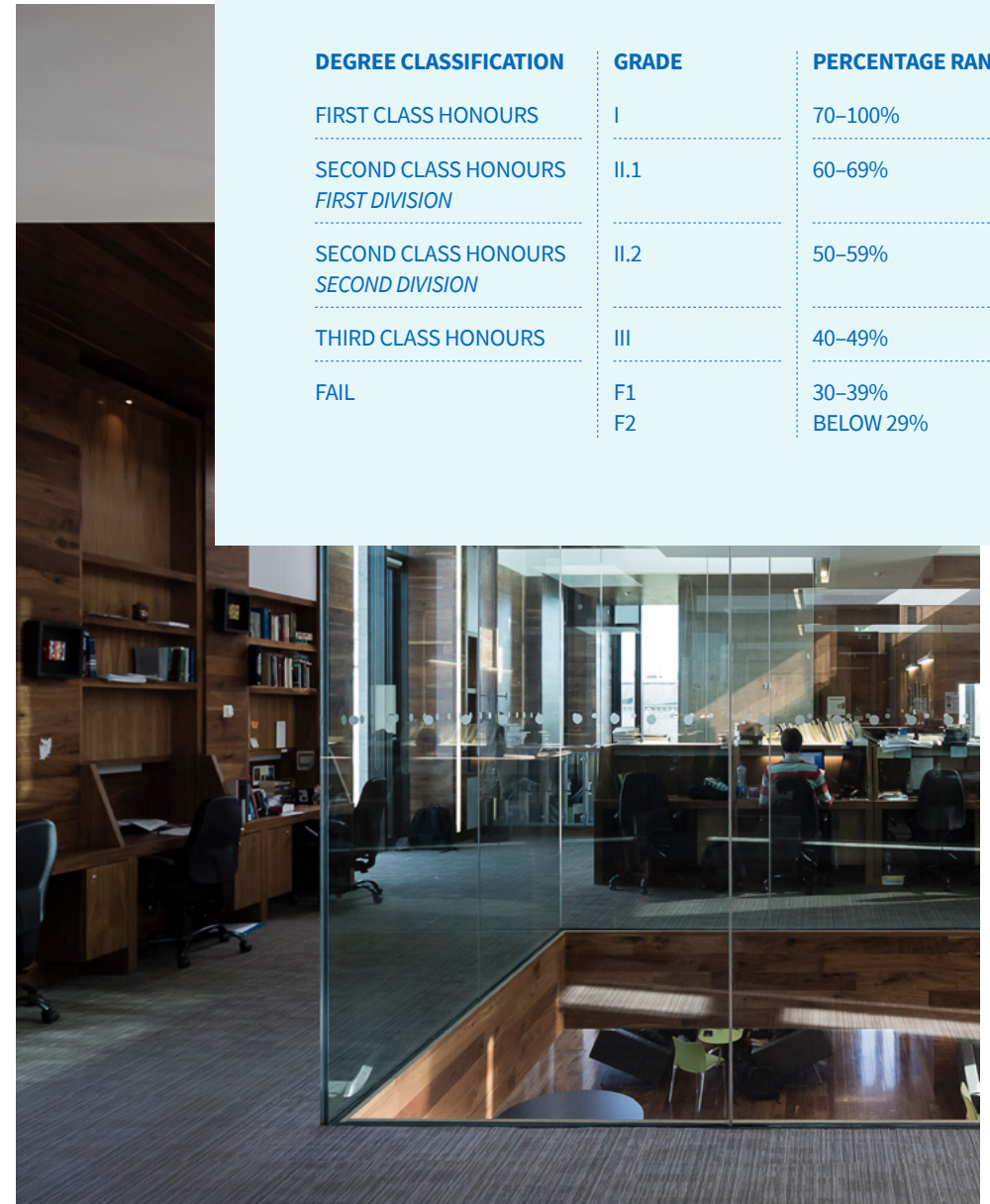
Students take 30 ECTS per semester at Trinity. ECTS (European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System) is a credit weighting, so the number of modules (classes) a student takes at Trinity varies on the credit values for each of their modules, which usually have a 5, 10 or 15 ECTS value. Students must take a minimum of 20 ECTS in a semester and 45 ECTS for the academic year. Make sure to check in with your home university or programme provider for credit load requirements.

Marking

The following marking scheme applies in Trinity. Please note that marks can vary among Faculties at Trinity, and it is important to recognise that the grades may be very different from those at your home institution. While First Class Honours may be common in your home university, please note that marks over 70 are very rare at Trinity. Make sure to discuss credit transfer and grade conversion with your home institution prior to studying abroad.

What Can I Study at Trinity

AREA OF STUDY	Special Requirements & Notes
FACULTY OF ARTS, HUMANITIES AND SOCIAL SCIENCES	
BUSINESS	Students with either a Major or a Minor in Business can apply. Students with no business experience may only be considered for introductory (Senior Fresh) level modules, unless they have prior learning in a relevant subject area such as economics.
CLASSICS	Classics is open to applicants from all disciplinary backgrounds.
DRAMA & THEATRE STUDIES	We have partnerships with the University of North and South Carolina provided they are studying Theatre. We cannot accept students from any university if they have not been studying Drama/Theatre prior.
ECONOMICS	Students who wish to take Senior Fresh, Junior Sophister or Senior Sophister modules must be majoring or minoring in Economics.
EDUCATION	Applicants should be taking Education as a major or minor component of their studies.
ENGLISH	Only students majoring in English will be considered for sophister modules. Students should have completed some English modules to be considered for fresh modules.
FILM STUDIES	Must be majoring Film or Communications. Assignments / Assessments in Film modules can require the ability to edit video essays — editing ability required.
FRENCH	Students are required to have a minimum A2 level of French for junior fresh modules. Minimum B1 for senior fresh modules. Minimum B2 for junior sophister modules.

AREA OF STUDY	Special Requirements & Notes
GERMANIC STUDIES	
HISPANIC STUDIES (SPANISH)	All Junior Sophister modules require a minimum of 2 years university-level Spanish or a B1 level of Spanish. All Senior Sophister modules require a minimum of three years of university-level Spanish or a B2 level of Spanish. SPU2206Y Portuguese Language (Beginners) does not have a prerequisite.
HISTORY	History is open to applicants from all disciplinary backgrounds. It is only possible to take Sophister module with the agreement of the History department co-ordinator and there is a limit of the number of total students who may take these modules.
HISTORY OF ART AND ARCHITECTURE	Relevant experience in Art History related subjects required.
IRISH AND CELTIC LANGUAGES	No specific entry requirements for most of the courses offered to Visiting Students. Students wishing to take Modern Irish modules (which are taught through Irish), or advanced Early Irish modules should consult with the Department regarding their previous experience/ability.
ITALIAN	Applicants for Italian language modules (except first year beginners) may be asked for proof of Italian language level/number of years studied.
LAW	Spaces are limited for students who are not majoring or minoring in Law.
LINGUISTICS	Relevant experience in Linguistics related subjects required. An admissions decision may take longer for this subject area as this subject assesses applications at the school-level.
MUSIC	Only 2 music modules are available to non-EU visiting students. An admissions decision may take longer for this subject area as this subject assesses applications at the school-level.

AREA OF STUDY	Special Requirements & Notes
NEAR AND MIDDLE EASTERN STUDIES	Students who have not previously studied Arabic/Hebrew/Turkish are only eligible to take second year beginner's level modules in the discipline.
PHILOSOPHY	Must be majoring/minoring in Philosophy.
POLITICAL SCIENCE	Must be majoring/minoring in Political Science.
PSYCHOLOGY	Preference given to Psychology majors. All students must have successfully completed an introductory module to psychology or equivalent (e.g.- psychology 101). AP credit for introductory psychology can also be accepted.
RELIGIOUS STUDIES	All first to third year modules open to visiting students with no entry requirements.
RUSSIAN AND SLAVONIC STUDIES	An admissions decision may take longer for this subject area as this subject assesses applications at the school-level.
SOCIAL WORK AND SOCIAL POLICY	Preference given to social work/sociology/ social policy majors.
SOCIOLOGY	Must be majoring/minoring in Sociology.
FACULTY OF SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY, ENGINEERING AND MATHEMATICS	
BIOCHEMISTRY AND IMMUNOLOGY	Relevant experience in Biomedical Science subjects required. An admissions decision may take longer for this subject area as this subject assesses applications at the school-level.
BIOLOGY	Relevant experience in Biology related subjects required. For entry into Senior Freshman Biology, students should be majoring in Biology.
BOTANY	Relevant experience in Biology related subjects required — in particular modules covering form and function of plants, general ecology and evolution.
CHEMISTRY	Relevant experience in Chemistry related subjects required. An admissions decision may take longer for this subject area as this subject assesses applications at the school-level.

AREA OF STUDY	Special Requirements & Notes
COMPUTER SCIENCE AND STATISTICS	Must be majoring in Computer Science.
ENGINEERING: GENERAL AND MECHANICAL, CIVIL AND ELECTRONIC, AND BIOMEDICAL	Relevant experience in Engineering related subjects required.
GENETICS	Must have completed and achieved a pass mark in modules on cell biology, molecular biology, biochemistry and genetics.
GEOGRAPHY	Geography majors preferred.
GEOLOGY	Relevant experience in Geology related subjects required. An admissions decision may take longer for this subject area as this subject assesses applications at the school-level.
MATHEMATICS	Must currently be an undergraduate mathematics student, or majoring in mathematics.
MICROBIOLOGY	Available to full year students only.
PHYSICS	Relevant experience in Physics related subjects required. An admissions decision may take longer for this subject area as this subject assesses applications at the school-level.
ZOOLOGY	Relevant experience in Biology related subjects required. An admissions decision may take longer for this subject area as this subject assesses applications at the school-level.
FACULTY OF HEALTH SCIENCES	
NURSING AND MIDWIFERY	Please note that no clinical modules are available in this subject, but there are a range of other theory-based modules available across all disciplines of Nursing and Midwifery. Teaching calendar may vary. For more information, email snm.global@tcd.ie .



Applying to Study Abroad at Trinity

Eligibility Requirements

Students must be currently registered at a university in good standing and have completed a minimum of two years study at a high standard. A minimum cumulative Grade Point Average (or equivalent) of 3.1 out of 4.0. If English is not your first language, you will also need to submit proof of English language proficiency. Tuition Fees

Fees for visiting students can be found on the Academic Registry website. Please note that total cost of attendance will vary based on your home university policies, programme and/or provider. 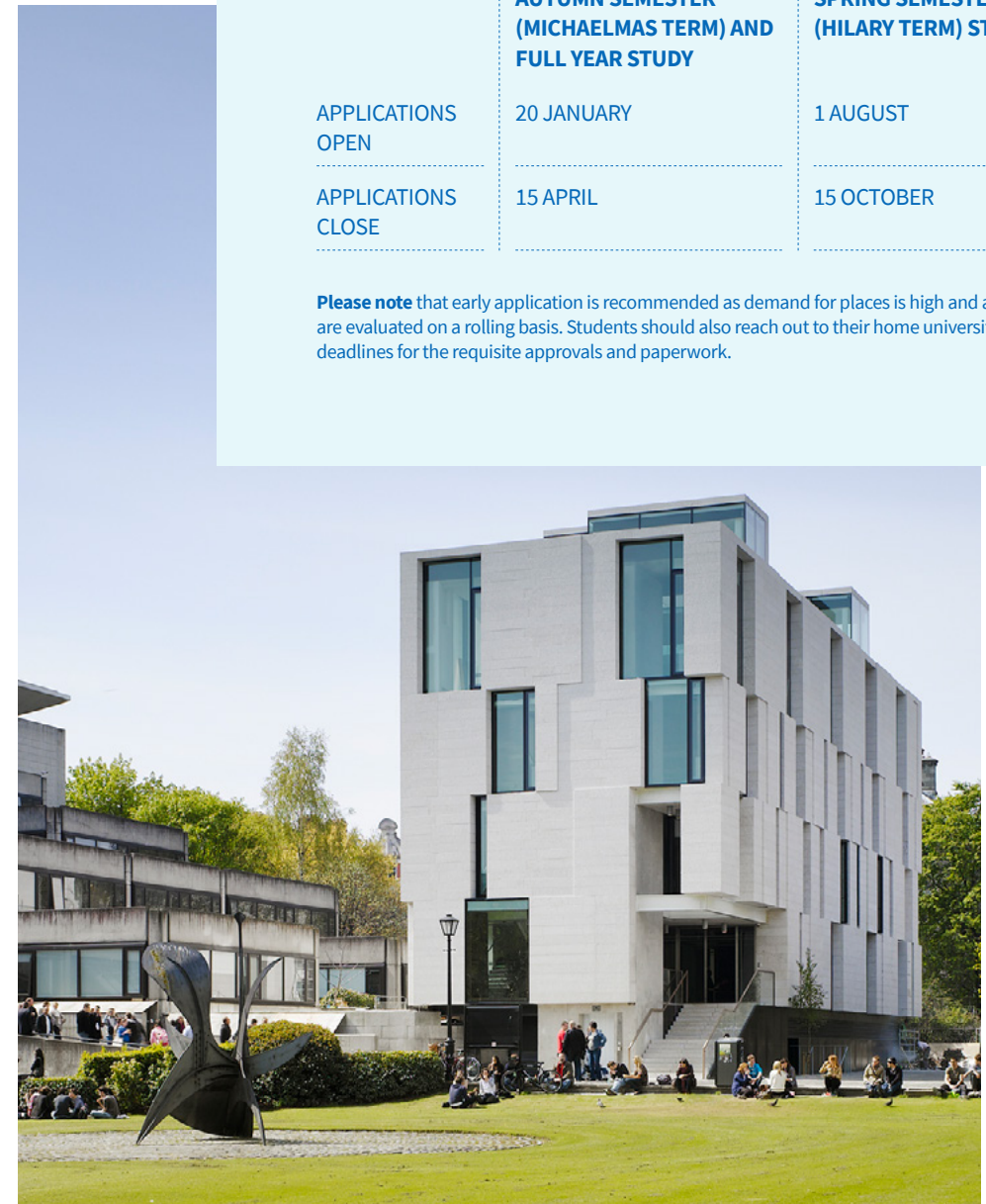

Please note that early application is recommended as demand for places is high and applications are evaluated on a rolling basis. Students should also reach out to their home university by their deadlines for the requisite approvals and paperwork.



Special Programmes

In addition to semester or year study abroad at Trinity, we offer the following bespoke programmes.

Semester Start-Up Programme

The Semester Start-Up Programme (SSP) is an excellent pre-orientation programme which offers students an immersive orientation to life in Trinity and an academic introduction to understanding Irish history and culture. SSP offers an overview of Irish history and culture through a combination of lectures and seminars, and excursions to national cultural institutions and historical landmarks are integral to the programme. The Autumn programme is worth 5 ECTS (credits) and is three weeks in duration. The Spring programme is not credit-bearing and one week in duration. The SSP is optional, but open to all international visiting and exchange students who wish to enrol. Semester Abroad Programme: Conflict, Religion and Peace-building in International Affairs

This programme is open to students studying abroad at Trinity for a single semester. It provides challenging opportunities to attain a critical understanding of the perennially relevant fields of religion, conflict and peacebuilding. It is distinguished by the School's dynamic multidisciplinary approaches to teaching and research. Students develop critical insights into the dynamics of faith and culture in the face of shifting 'modernities.'

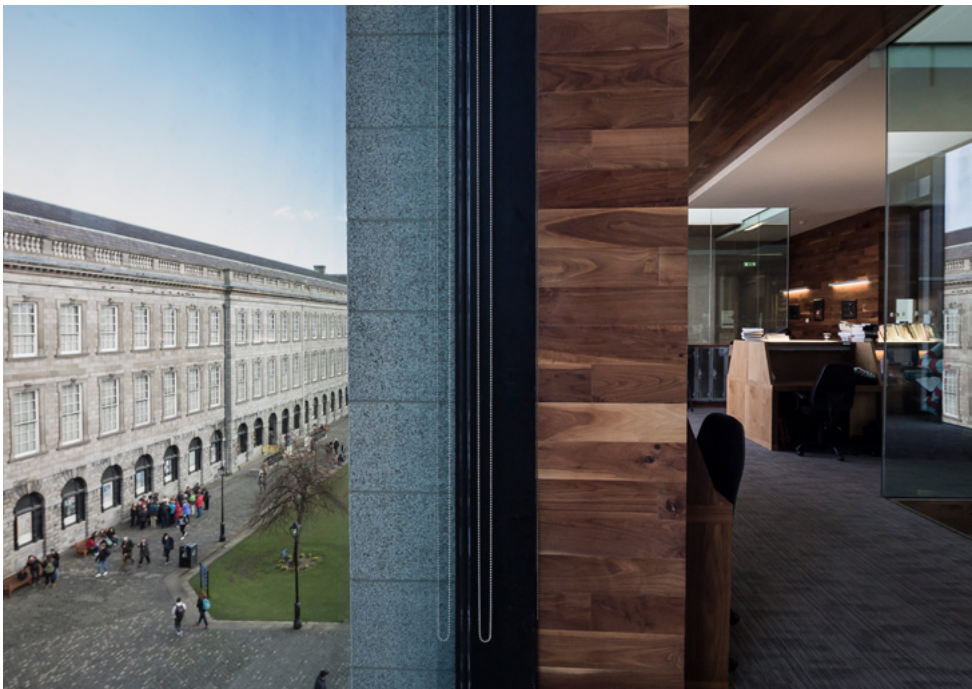
The contested causes and consequences of violence are analysed, together with religion's role in maintaining sectarian violence and/or promoting mutual understanding in local and global spheres. Students have the opportunity to take cultural field trips to Northern Ireland (during Michaelmas Term), or the UN in Geneva (TBC - which is dependent on the annual timetable). Participants who come from every continent find innovative prospects for relating theory and practice and engaging contemporary issues and case studies. Modules available (which vary from year to year) include: Religion, Conflict and Peace in International Relations (10 ECTS), Engaging Religious Fundamentalism (10 ECTS), Gender, War and Peace (10 ECTS), and Liberationist and Interreligious Theologies (10 ECTS). Working in Ireland

Students with passports from outside the EU/EEA/ Switzerland/UK coming to Trinity on a visiting or exchange basis for a full academic year may be eligible to work up to a maximum of 20 hours per week during term and up to 40 hours per week during university holidays. Single semester students with passports from outside the EU/EEA/Switzerland/UK are not permitted to work in Ireland.

College Health Service

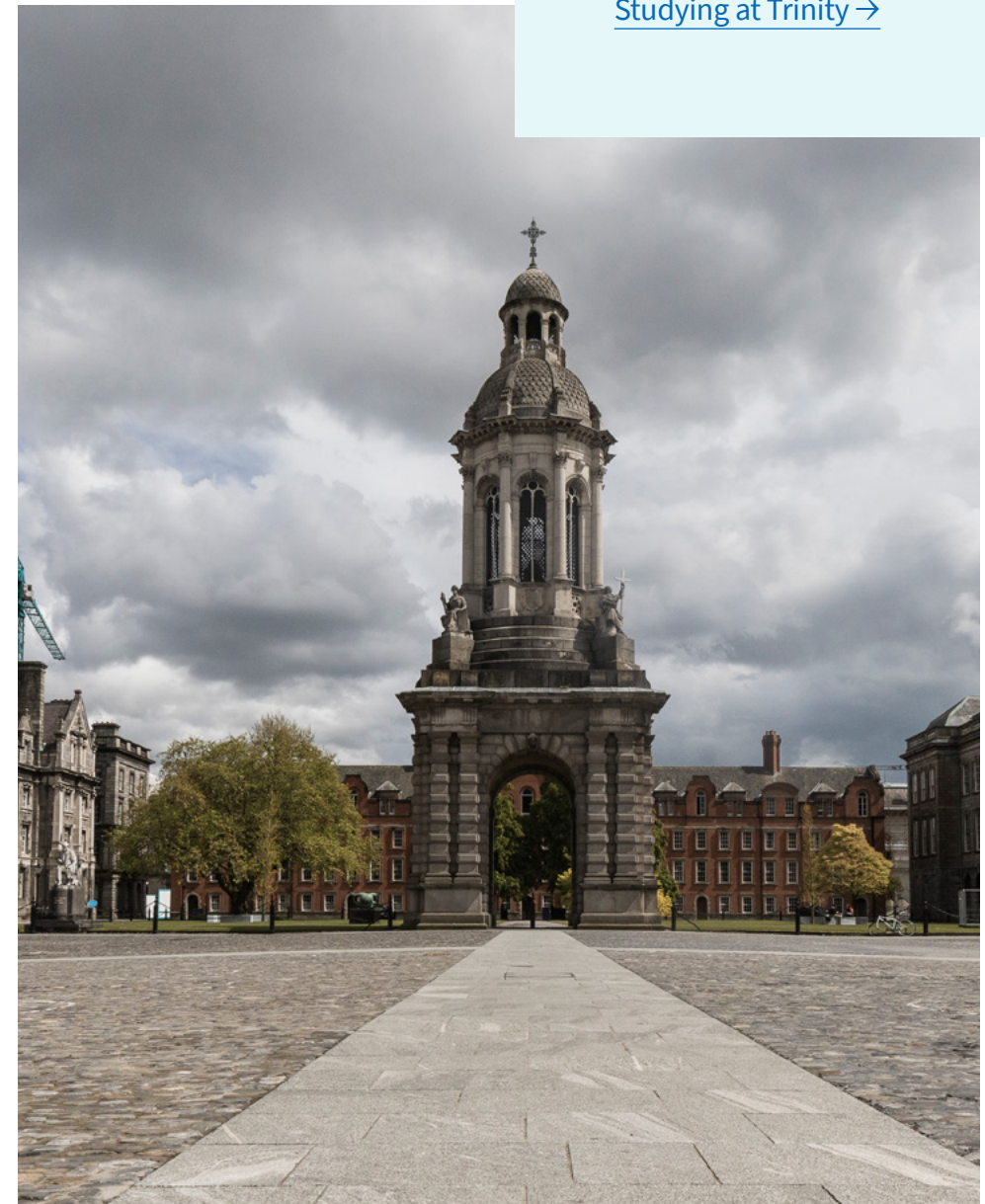
