
Abbott SciFest workshops



PATH 4 Government Announcement

We were very proud to have been invited to a photo call on Wednesday July 3rd with Taoiseach Simon Harris, Minister Patrick O'Donovan and Minister Hildegarde Naughton for an exciting announcement about the third level programmes for students with intellectual disabilities being supported through the PATH 4 Phase 2 funding.

Issued by the Government Press Office on 3 July 2024

Taoiseach and Minister O'Donovan announce expansion of transformational third level courses for students with intellectual disabilities.

- From September, eight courses will be rolled out for students with intellectual disabilities
- Three courses will commence from January 2025 including an additional course in TUS which has been approved
- · All courses will be free

Taoiseach Simon Harris and Minister for Further and Higher Education Patrick O'Donovan have announced additional investment and the rollout of courses for students with intellectual disabilities under the Programme for Access to Higher Education (PATH 4).

The courses, which will be available across the country, will be free of charge to students.

In addition to the ten courses already approved under PATH 4 Phase 2 funding, a new course at the Technological University of the Shannon (TUS) will be made available for students.



Speaking today, Taoiseach Simon Harris said:

"This is a particularly proud day for me. When I was Minister for Further and Higher Education, we announced the successful courses and today we confirm their start dates.

"As Taoiseach, I want to create an education system is equal for everyone. This announcement ensures a person with an intellectual disability is afforded the same opportunities as any of their peers.

"I want to thank the Higher Education Authority, the Department of Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science, university leaders and Minister O'Donovan for their leadership in bringing these plans to fruition.

"Most of all, I want to thank the young men and women in the Trinity Centre for Intellectual Disabilities who inspired us to deliver this change across third level. Today is for them."

Minister O'Donovan said:

"These students had achieved so much to get to Higher Level and are a credit to their families and communities for doing so. It was really important to me that we didn't put any further challenges in their way, when they have faced and cleared so many hurdles to get to this point in their lives.

"These courses have been designed with the learner at heart. They can transform the lives of students and their families, helping them thrive, leading to further education and employment.

"The new course in TUS supports further opportunities for students with intellectual disabilities.

"Earlier this year, my Department announced the first 10 higher education institutions across the country who are providing courses funded under the PATH 4 programme.

"This extra investment of over €1 million brings the total investment in PATH 4 Phase 2 to over €11m over three years. I look forward to the feedback on these courses during this initial three-year pilot scheme."

PATH is a dedicated fund which supports the delivery of equity of access objectives under the NAP and has been provided to increase participation by under-represented groups in higher education. PATH 4 Phase 2 is the funding programme which has been made available by the Department for the provision of courses in Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) for students with intellectual disabilities.



Louise Callinan, Head of Access Policy at the Higher Education Authority, said:

"Improving opportunities for students with intellectual disabilities to engage in higher education is a core commitment in the National Access Plan 2022-2028.

"The investment of over €11m in this pilot under PATH 4 Phase 2 will support the enhancement of provision for students with intellectual disabilities across 11 higher education institutions and will inform future policy.

"I would like to acknowledge the considerable ongoing work by the 11 higher education institutions to develop these programmes and to support meaningful pathways for students with intellectual disabilities."



Disability Rights Event

The 2nd Year ASIAP Students at Trinity Centre for People with Intellectual Disabilities (TCPID) hosted a remarkable **Disability Rights Awareness Event** on Tuesday April 30th 2024, featuring distinguished guest speakers who brought valuable insights to the discussion.

The event was called Your Voice, Your Vote.



The invited speakers were:

Art O'Leary - Chief Executive of the Electoral Commission (An Coimisiún Toghcháin)

Hugo MacNeill - TCPID Ambassador

Students engaged in discussions with the guest speakers surrounding the significance of voting and its role in creating positive change within society. Despite acknowledging the importance of voting, several challenges were identified:

- 1. Confusing Instructions: Some individuals found the voting instructions unclear.
- 2. Identification of Voting Papers: Difficulty in distinguishing between different voting papers.
- 3. Simplification of Language: Requests for simpler language to facilitate better understanding.
- 4. Accessibility of Help: Awareness needed regarding available assistance for voting.
- 5. Limited Support Hours: Concerns raised about the limited support available during specific hours.
- 6. Rushed Voting Experience: Some felt rushed due to queues and time constraints.
- 7. Accessibility of Polling Stations: Issues with accessibility and barriers at certain polling stations.

Despite these challenges, the event highlighted positive aspects, including the friendly and helpful attitude of staff at polling stations and the accessibility of some stations.



Moving forward, students proposed several recommendations to improve the voting experience for individuals with disabilities:

Creation of easily understandable and accessible ballot papers.

Utilisation of technology for translations and easy-to-read formats.

Provision of support throughout the day, well-advertised and accessible to all.

Ensuring all election materials are accessible, including support for homeless individuals.

Increased representation of disabled people in elections.

The guest speakers addressed questions from students regarding voting, barriers to voting, and the political landscape for disabled individuals. The collaboration between TCPID and the Electoral Commission proved fruitful, with plans to address barriers to voting in the future.

Dr Vivian Rath, who co-ordinates the Disability Rights module, remarked there was a few potential future politicians or senators from the student planning group that would be brilliant public representatives with lived experience of disability, to which the guest speakers both agreed.

As students continue their journey in advocating for disability rights, they draw inspiration from the valuable contributions of Art O'Leary and Hugo MacNeill, whose dedication to fostering inclusive communities is truly commendable.

Overall, the event was a resounding success, raising awareness about disability rights and the importance of inclusive participation in the democratic process.



Exploring Co-Learning: Collaboration between the School of English and the TCPID, School of Education

Trinity College Dublin has launched a collaborative educational initiative, the Co-Learning pilot project, bringing together students from the TCPID and undergraduate students from the School of English.

During the Hilary Teaching Term 2024, TCPID students voluntarily participated in an Irish Writing Module offered by the School of English. These sessions, which occurred weekly, included bridging lectures alongside academic staff and Co-Learning Champions. The aim was to prepare TCPID students for subsequent tutorials with their undergraduate peers.

The Co-Learning Module is designed to promote inclusive education by fostering collaboration and mutual learning among students from diverse academic backgrounds. Visit of Japanese delegation to TCPID

The TCPID were delighted to welcome a visiting delegation from **Yutaka College in Japan** on June 25th and 26th. The members of the visiting team from Yutaka College included **Mr Masato Hasegawa, Mrs Mie Hasegawa, Ms Yukiko Kamiya, Ms Miwa Miyairi and Dr Rieko Fry** who acted as interpreter throughout the visit.

Mr and Mrs Hasegawa set up Yutaka College in 2015 and since then have provided educational programmes for students with intellectual disabilities in over eight campuses in Tokyo, Kanagawa, Fukuoka and Nagasaki.

The four-year programme currently running covers 10 subjects in the first and second years (health care / culture and arts / economics / work / academic skills / assessment / independence etc.), with a focus on employment on the third and fourth years.

The visit was coordinated by **Dr. John Kubiak** who had previously met with Mr. and Mrs Hasegawa in 2017 when they were in the process of visiting several countries worldwide (US / Canada / Australia / Korea / Europe). At that time, they visited 20 programmes in nine countries to build on their knowledge of current post-educational programmes and to network with others who are currently delivering inclusive programmes outside Japan.

During their visit to the TCPID Mr and Mrs Hasegawa wanted to learn more about the TCPID and how it has progressed since their last visit. They also shared with us what they had learned from their visits to other parts of the world, namely USA, Canada, Australia, Korea, Spain, Italy, Denmark and Sweden and also outlined the current situation in Japan.

Following the visit the president of Yutaka College Mr. Masato Hasegawa sent the following message:

Thank you so much for sharing your valuable time with us. We've all found our meetings extremely helpful, positive and resourceful. We would like to take back everything we've learned at TCPID and help us improve the standard of education for people with ID back in Japan. We feel deeply grateful to you for arranging all the talks with so many wonderful people in your team at TCPID. We felt so honoured and privileged. Thank you very much. Interview with Ciaran

Can you tell us a little bit about yourself and your background?

My name is Ciaran Moran. I live with my parents in Co. Meath. I have two older brothers. My interests are cycling, walking, hiking. I love meeting new people. I love hanging out with my friends. I like going to the cinema. I'm also a big soccer fan.

Can you tell us about Trinity College, and your time here as a student and what the experience was like.?

I started the course in September 2020. It was during Covid. It was all completely online for the first year. It was very difficult getting used to using the computer, using Zoom, Microsoft Teams. Trying to do lectures online, trying to concentrate, doing our presentations online as well, which was difficult enough and also trying to socialise with our classmates. That was very hard as we didn't get to know each other properly until second year.

How did you get to know them actually?

In first year we didn't really because we were all in different locations but in second year we got to know each other because we were back on campus for two days a week so there was more socialising and mixing.

And did you prefer being in person?

Oh absolutely. I much preferred being in person because there is nothing like the real in person contact.

So your class was one of the hardest hit by Covid.

Yes, student orientation and everything were all online.

I suppose being able to access everything online with the new laptops helped because everyone had what they needed – right?

Yes, the laptops were a great help from the **Rory McDonagh Trust**. They really helped because we would have struggled without them. If we didn't have a laptop and we were trying to do everything on our phones, it just wouldn't have worked. We wouldn't have been able to do our assignments or anything.

Actually, that's where it all started with the laptops, so your class are probably the most skilled at the online stuff. - Better than anyone.

Yes definitely. We had to get used to it very quickly.

But coming back in second year was definitely a highlight for you.

Yes much, much better.

What was your favourite thing about your time as a student in Trinity?

I suppose getting to know my classmates. Having lunch with them. Doing sports in the Sports Centre was really good as well because it was a different place to go to and we were on the campus and we could try lots of different sports.

Also the graduation was really fantastic because all the hard work had paid off. It was a very special day.

How did you feel going up and getting your parchment?

It was unbelievable, really special.

So you mentioned the Sports Centre, so what did you enjoy the most there? Did you join any clubs or was it just the classes that you loved in the Sports Centre?

I just enjoyed the classes. They were fun and it was nice to kind of get away from studying and trying to concentrate in classes. It was nice to try new sports that I never did before.

What type of things did you try?

I tried tennis. I think we did handball as well. And we did soccer, basketball. I think we did kind of like a circuit thing as well. Learning how to do lots of different exercises for warm up and everything.

And, given that you are now working in the Library, did you ever use the Library as a student?

So when we were students, unfortunately Covid restrictions were still in place, so we did use it once or twice. We did the orientation there, but it was only a few of us. The second time we used it with Des for a research project. So Geraldine showed us how to kind of use the catalogue and how to find the books. She showed everybody, this is how you find you books etc.



So you couldn't just go in?

No, but I do remember returning a book on a machine.

I think because people weren't able to use it for a while, they appreciate it so much more.

Definitely. There are way more people in it now.

What were your favourite modules on the Certificate in Arts, Science and Inclusive Applied Practice?

So my favourite modules would have been Disability Rights because we learnt everything disability and our rights. Also we did a thing with the Minister where we asked him in for an event and asked him questions about employment for people with intellectual disabilities. That was really great. It was really special.

Also, Occupational Therapy. Having one-to-one sessions with Barbara.

Also, the Work Experience module with you and Barbara. That was really good as well.

Researching with Des.

Poetry with John.

And the Sports Centre.

That's everything. You loved everything.

Basically yes.

That's great to hear that from you. And you mentioned the Work Placement module, so where did you do your work placement?

So I did my work placement in the **National Lottery**. That was fun, really fun, getting to shadow in all of the departments to see what goes on in each department. It was really good. A good learning experience.

And you did such a good job that they invited you back. Actually you were the first student ever to go into the National Lottery, so you set the bar very high. You did a really, really good job and all the team loved you so much so they invited you back which was a really great experience.

Yeah it was really good.





So you were invited back to the National Lottery to do your first internship, so do you want to tell us a little bit about that and the work that you did there?

So, when I was doing my internship in the National Lottery I was working in the mailroom with Mya, Zagita and the manager Brian. So my duties were to open the post, check the post, write checklists for claim forms for customers who sent in their scratch cards who were a bit unsure if they won something or not. After that I would deliver the claim forms to the Claims department so that they could process them. I would collect post that the Claims department had to send them out to the people who won the money.

I also did the filing for the checklist for the Lotto draws that they did in the Lottery. I was responsible for making sure that they were all in order. I would have to write the Draw Manager's name on it so the Draw Manager would know to collect this checklist and file it for any auditing reasons.

That is actually such a responsible role, because you are effectively handling money. These are tickets that often win people lots of money so for them to trust you that much with that role is a real credit to you.

So how long were you in the National Lottery?

So, I was in there for 6 months, so from September 2022 to March 2023.

And I remember you said to me that you had always thought that you might like to work in a library. So the minute you told me that I had plans for the Library here. So do you want to tell us a little bit about when you started your internship in the Library?

So, it was last July actually. It was really great. Fantastic! So I suppose the duties that I was doing there were, first of all I was putting books back on shelves that had to be reshelved, checking for books that were marked as lost, seeing they were actually lost or not.

I also do weeding, so if they have old editions of books they have to go off the book shelves because there is not much room for them anymore, especially if they buy new editions of books. But the good thing is that when they do that, they send the old versions off to some charity so they are not gone to waste. It's a really good idea.

I also work on the counter. So, when I work on the counter I serve students and staff and I search for books for them as well. I also show them to see where the books are. So if they can't find a book I would go up to them and see if the book is on the shelf. I would bring them up and explain to them you know, this is the History section, this is the Law section and then check if the book is in the right place. If it's not, then I would check if it's in the sorting area. So they put them there before they actually put them back on the shelves. Student shelvers do that. And then if you can't find a book, I would just check in the records, see when it was last checked out. If it was checked out a long time ago, we would just mark it as lost. I would notify someone in the library and hopefully they might buy



a new copy of the book. It depends how many copies of the book there are.

Also, inclusion, I love doing inclusion videos with Siobhan and Geraldine.

So tell me a little bit about that. What does that involve?

So, it's for the TCPID students here, so it just was getting them to see where the different parts of the Library to make it as easy as possible for them. So, showing them like where the barrier is, how to use the barrier, where the toilets are,

So you do the video of doing it?

Yes, so showing them, like...'on you left are the toilets, the barrier is straight ahead, here are the library guards, any problem you can go to the library guards. How to use the counter, if you want to collect a book, if you want to speak to someone, how to use the machines...'

And obviously it's like a full circle so you are supporting our new students coming in. So that's amazing for them to have you.

What is your absolute favourite thing about working in the Library?

Socialising with my colleagues, my work colleagues. getting to know them really well.

Serving students and staff on the counter. Chatting to them and giving them a first-class customer experience.

Yes and also the inclusion as well. I love doing that as well.

And how do your colleagues support you in the Library?

So my colleagues have supported me from the very beginning. They were really supportive. I felt very welcomed as part of a team.

Straight away I could ask them any question. They were very approachable. I couldn't ask for a better team really.

So who do you work with mostly?

So I work with my Line Manager Gerard and with Peter, but I also work with Siobhan and Geraldine on the inclusion projects. And also the other counter team as well.

They are all very easy to approach and they offer advice as well. If there are things coming up they say it to me.

I think they can see such potential in you and they are encouraging you to go for things.

So can you tell me about the new role, how you heard about it and what you had to do to get it?

The new role was a Twilighter role. It's a Library Assistant job. So I heard about it when they advertised it on the staff emails. So if you are interested in a job in the Library you have to express an interest in it and then depending on how many people go for it you do a chat or an interview.

So when you do the chit chat they say, 'okay thanks for expressing an interest in the job...'

Depending on certain factors, but with mine, he just goes.....
'Congratulations you got the job. Now that you are a permanent
member of the Library team, down the line you can apply for other
jobs.'

And how did you feel when you found out that you were permanent?

Unbelievable! It was a really proud moment because all the hard work paid off. And they know that you can definitely do this job and it shows that they really trust you.

Congratulations! It's such a credit to you that you got it. Its nervewracking to put yourself forward, but you did it and you got it! And the more you do that, the more confidence you'll get.

They're very strange the interview chats. They're kind of formal but they're not too bad.

Yeah, so they want to put you at ease, so it's not super formal and because they know you already, but you still have to prepare. So were you nervous going in to it?



Oh yes. You're also nervous because you don't know how many people have applied for it.

And you would have put a lot of work into getting ready for that and that is such a credit to you, so you earned it. So you are now a permanent member of staff in Trinity College Dublin which is unbelievable. And this is only the start of your career journey.

So what do you like most about Trinity and being a staff member of Trinity?

There is so much vibrancy, so much energy. There is so much going on. There is never a dull moment I suppose.

That's true. That's why I love it as well actually.

There is so much going on. You meet so many different people, tourists, everything, asking you so many different things. And also there is so much to do in it. It's so big, you can walk around and get lost in it.

Yeah exactly. It's lovely and especially in the Library you come out and there is greenery all around you

Also it's really accessible to get to. It's right in the city centre. You don't have to worry about anything for transport because everything goes to the city centre. It's so easy to get to.

So you get the bus from Navan. A direct bus right?
Yes.

So hopefully you see your future in Trinity long-term?

Oh I'm definitely staying. I'm definitely staying.

In the Library there's always different jobs coming up in different sections.

And the thing is you're in there now, you're doing a brilliant job and opportunities will present themselves as you go through.

So the new role that you're starting in September is great but aren't you going in next week to start another project as well.

I am doing some project work with Siobhan and Geraldine, thinking about inclusion for the students here and also for disability students, trying to make the Library more accessible and to remove any barriers for students with disabilities because I, as a person with a disability, understand how difficult it can be to go into a big massive library. It can be a bit intimidating because it's so big and you can get lost so easily. You don't even know where you are going. It's not easy to find your way around.



So you are going to help them to try and make it more accessible and inclusive.

Yes, to remove as many barriers as possible.

So, one thing I wanted to ask you was how do you think you've changed personally since you started way back in 2020?

Well I've definitely got more confident. More belief I suppose. I've also learnt so many new skills, for example public speaking skills which I do not particularly like but it's part of any job really, unfortunately. It's a very, very important skills to have. Previously I never had to do it, so when something new comes along it can be a bit scary.

But also I want to thank all the TCPID team for all the support they have offered me – Marie, Barbara and all the tutors. The support was amazing, during the course and after the course. I really appreciate it.

I do remember you and everyone who has ever done this course saying, 'I'll never be able to do presentations.'. They are terrified of them and in nearly every module you have to do something, don't you?

And that's the good thing about it isn't it. Even though when you're a student you go...'oh no..' but you know long-term it's stands to you.

And you know what I really admire about you and about all your classmates, is that even though something makes you nervous you do it anyway. And then isn't there such a feeling of achievement.

Oh definitely, if you don't do it, you might regret it because you need to push yourself.

And one thing that I might add in is that I remember your Entrepreneurship project with your lecturer Phil. I remember that Phil was so blown away by your project and your presentation that she just couldn't believe how good it was. Do you remember what your project was about?

I think it was a Gaming Café. It was actually really fun because you had to come up with an idea that you were really interested in and I think if you're interested in something you really want to do more about it. It's not a pain to do it. You're doing it because you want to do it and because you're interested in it.

So finally what are your goals for the future?

My goals for the future are to live independently and to work full time. I suppose to promote inclusion in the Library, to keep working on inclusion in the Library to make it more accessible for students and staff with disabilities.



Is there anything else that you want to say to the people in the Library?

Just to thank them for all the support that they have given me and making me feel so at home and from day one it has been such a positive experience. Also in the National Lottery as well. It really stands to you when you do the internships because the skills you get are so good.

You can't buy skills, you can't buy this experience. You can't beat this experience when you are going for a job because it stands so much to you.

Interview with Dr. John Kubiak

Our colleague **Sadbh Feehan** sat down with John recently to interview him about his time in Trinity College.

Q.1 What made you want to work in the TCPID?

I recall a moment in 2015 when I was watching the RTE 6 o'clock news. One of the featured pieces was of a group of individuals with intellectual disabilities who undertook and completed a 6 month pilot educational programme in Trinity. I remember listening to their experiences of participating in this innovative initiative and being blown away! In the following year when the opportunity arose for me to work with these trailblazing learners, I jumped at the opportunity.

My decision to work in this area of education was very much informed by my vision of inclusion, and how this aligned with the ethos of the TCPID, i.e. to enable people with an intellectual disability to develop their potential and to provide a solid foundation for students to enjoy



successful academic and social outcomes. I also wanted to work in an environment that meaningfully pushed the boundaries of inclusion, and where - in collaboration with many amazing professionals - I could be part of the ongoing creation of higher education opportunities for students with intellectual disabilities.

Q.2 When did you start working in the TCPID?

I started to teach on the Certificate in Contemporary Living (the first full-time inclusive Irish Higher Educational programme) in 2006 and joined TCD as Teaching & Learning Officer in 2008.

Q.3 What is your role and what does it involve?

My role is quite varied – it may involve curriculum development & design; module development & writing; student well-being; liaising with national / international colleagues, presenting at conferences / Open Days, as well as supervision of post-graduates on the School of Education Master in Education and Professional Master in Education programmes.

However, my first love is teaching - I teach on a variety of modules for the ASIAP course (Learning Theory & Practice / Personal a & Self-Development / Exploring Art: Renaissance to Modern / Poetry).

I'm also involved in research – my interests mainly focus on exploring how the voices of university students with intellectual disabilities can inform our understanding of effective inclusive pedagogical practices. I acknowledge that people with intellectual disabilities are experts of their own experiences and have a critical role to play in conveying their

subjective experiences which is crucial to our understanding of inclusive teaching and inclusive research.

Q.4 What are some of the biggest changes you noticed during your years working in inclusive education?

Students are getting younger (or maybe I'm getting older!!).

On a more serious note, one major change I've noticed is that there is an increased awareness of meaningful inclusion present in Higher Educational environments; students with intellectual disabilities are welcomed on campuses across the country, to work, laugh and learn with their peers, just like everyone else. In addition, for the first time, there is now a dedicated fund entitled PATH 4 provided by the Government, which will increase opportunities for students with intellectual disabilities to access higher education. Such policies and practices will redress inequities in opportunities that have hitherto been denied this group of learners, and paradoxically, in the not-to-near future, I'm confident that students with intellectual disabilities will be seen as a 'typical' part of the diverse student body.

Q.5 What has been your proudest moment in work?

There are many proud moments. There are times in the classroom when I witness a magical transformation process happening in a student in the form of academic and confidence growth. These moments are important for me (and for any educator) as enhancing such increased self-awareness in students allows learning to be a catalyst for transformation. When a student's pre-conceived notions about themselves have being transformed, or when a student has a moment of profound insight, this



increased awareness can help break through their habitual patterns of thought and behaviour.

Graduation ceremonies also make me proud and are always special for students, parents / family and staff. A key moment that sticks out for me is the first graduation of students with intellectual disabilities back in 2008. This was the first time in the history of TCD (since 1591!) that people with intellectual disabilities were able to graduate with their peers in the Trinity's Examination Hall. This event was covered by RTE and was featured on the 6pm news and on Nationwide.

On a more personal level there are other proud moments. For example, being recognised for both my teaching and scholarship by Trinity - in 2012 I received the prestigious Provost Teaching Award, and in 2014, I was awarded a Doctorate in Education.

Q.6 What are your favourite memories since you have been in TCPID?

So much of what we do in the TCPID is collaborative, and the memories of my accomplishments reflect the interdependence of many contributors. I have great memories of:

- Being inspired by some unique leaders and visionaries who have advanced my personal and professional growth.
- Working with and befriending wonderful and supportive colleagues –
 it was a privilege to be part of such a brilliant and dedicated team in
 which foolish humour and rigorous learning go hand in hand.
- Learning from inspiring students. I am indebted to the many students
 who thought they were learning from me!! However, without
 realising it, they were actually teaching me! It was a privilege to be
 invited into their life-world experiences.
- The day I received a Full-time TCD Parking permit after being on a waiting list for over 10 years!
